FUND CAMPAIGN SET AT \$161,625

\$63,720 Allotment Planned For Community Chest In Lima

The campaign goal of the Allen-co War Chest in its drive this fall on behalf of 28 agencies will be \$161,625, Horace Riggs, campaign chairman, announced Saturday. Of this amount, \$97,905 will go to the U. S. O. and other National War Fund agencies, and \$63,720 will be allotted to the Lima Community Chest. Approximately \$32,635 of the total goal will be raised in the county area outside of Lima. Riggs pointed out.

The U. S. O. will receive approximately 50 per cent of the \$125,000,000 National War Fund goal," Riggs stated. Other national agencies participating in the National War Fund are: The British War Relief Society, United China Relief, Greek War Relief Association, Russian War Relief, War Prisoners Aid, French Relief Fund, United Seamen's Service, Queen Wilhelmina Fund, Polish War Relief, U. S. Committee for Care of European Children, United Yugoslav Relief Fund, Norwegian Relief Society, Refugee Relief Trustees and the United Czechoslovak Relief Fund.

The ten agencies in the Lima Community Chest, and the Allen-co U. S. O. War Activities Committee complete the list of participating agencies in the Allen-co War Chest.

After careful study by the Budget Committee of the War Chest, the agency requests for funds were approved, and the Executive Committee set the campaign goal for the coming campaign. James J. Weadock, Jr., president of the Allen-co War Chest, said, "It is the largest goal that the citizens of Allen-co have ever had in a voluntary drive of this nature, but I feel confident that we will meet the challenge and thus bring victory for this all-out war just one step nearer."

Members of the Campaign Committee who will assist in directing the campaign are now being selected.

"FOOD FOR VICTORY" IS THEME OF 80TH ANNUAL AUGLAIZE-CO FAIR EVENT

(Lima News Bureau) WAPAKONETA, Aug. 7.—"Food for Victory" will be the theme of the 80th annual Auglaize-co fair to be held here Aug. 29-Sept. 3. Sec. Harry Kahn announced in disclosing additional attractions booked for the week. The fair board secretary also revealed that a picture of the Victory Gardens in the oval of the race track would appear as the front cover of the Ohio Farmer, an agricultural magazine. There are 21 Victory Gardens in the oval.

In addition, Kahn announced that an organist from a Toledo theatre would provide entertainment throughout the afternoons and evenings on an organ in the grandstand.

Fund demonstrations will be held Monday and Tuesday mornings under the sponsorship of packing firms and glass can manufacturers. The fair secretary also is at-

tempting to secure Army and Navy departments to erect booths at the exposition and for the display of tanks and airplanes, in addition to a formation flight of Flying Fortresses over the fair grounds.

The Lima Westinghouse band and chorus, composed of 160 musicians, will appear at the Sunday afternoon session. In announcing the evening attraction, Kahn guaranteed that the presentation of "Cavalcade of Stars" would be one of the greatest extravaganzas produced at any county fair in the state.

A free game will prevail from Sunday until Tuesday noon. Monday night's program will feature eight of the county's high school bands with radio stars highlighting the Tuesday evening program.

The exposition's three-day harness horse racing program will open Wednesday afternoon and close with the running of the Fair derby Friday afternoon.

ENGLISH SOLDIERS FED BY CANTEEN WORKERS

In the past thousands of American soldiers have been aided and fed by the Lima canteen, operated by the American Women's Voluntary Services, and now it has been revealed that in recent days a number of English soldiers, who have arrived in this country for special training, are being treated by the local women.

Last week several letters arrived from soldier boys in which they praised the work of the local canteen.

In the last week a telegram from Dayton arrived in Lima asking if the woman at the Lima canteen could feed 24 hungry soldiers. The boys arrived and they claimed the food was delicious and among the best they had since they entered service.
