One that's filled with humor, or fancy, is likely to take the reader much farther from today's care than the use of any available amount of "C" coupons or railroad tickets. The Madison Free library has some new books that promise to be effective magic carpets.

Rosemary Taylor's mother ran a boarding house in Tuscon, Arizona . She had such a genuine interest in people that her boarders almost always involved the whole Taylor family in their joys and woes. "Chicken Every Sunday" glows with good humor, and is sure to coax a chuckle from anyone who takes the time to look at a few pages.

'Those Thurbers'

The Smiths are another heart-warming family. Anecdotes of their life in the year 1903-04 are recounted for our amusement by Sally Benson in "Meet Me in St. Louis." The Smiths and the Taylors do not seem to be very different from the Joneses next door, but the Thurbers! Perhaps it's just the way James Thurber tells it, but "My Life and Hard Times" presents a dizzying collection of eccentric people.

One reviewer has said that Rose Franken's Claudia is now a minor American institution. There is no question that she is one of the most popular and entertaining heroines in modern fiction. In "Another Claudia," Miss Franken brings her young matron face to face with the problems of the early months of the war.

Card is 'Gateway' A library card is the gate-way to fantastic worlds, where, for instance, the "Flying Yorkshireman" flies again. Eric Knight's version of Rudolph Hess' flight to England is one of the many delightful tall tales in "Sam Small Flies Again." Then there are the 17 unusual stories, mostly by otherwise sane and reasonable authors, collected under the title "Two Bottles of Relish." A borrower may choose one of the spine-chillers by Lord Dunsany, a scientific scare-you-well like "The Hopkins Manuscript," a satirical allegory like "Penguin Island," or a political fable like "The Devil and Daniel Webster."

Let Symphonies Record Music, Petrillo Urged

NEW YORK—(U.P)— Lifting of the union ban on the recording of symphony music has been strongly urged on James C. Petrillo, president of the American Federation of Musicians, by Marshall Field, president of the board of directors of the New York Philharmonic - Symphony orchestra, it was disclosed Saturday.

Field's suggestion was contained in a letter replying to a union request for permission to give free concerts in other cities by the Philharmonic-Symphony musicians. Field said the request could

be granted under certain conditions, which he outlined. Lifting of the recording ban was not specifically set down as one of the conditions, but Field's letter strongly implied that it would be most desir-

Field pointed out that the great symphony orchestras of this country are in a considerable measure dependent for their existence on royalties from their recordings. He also suggested that if the object of the proposed Petrillo concerts is to bring great music to those who might not otherwise hear it, the lifting of the recording ban would accomplish the same thing in much greater measure.

Before the letter was delivered to Petrillo, advance copies of it were submitted to other major symphonic organizations. Telegrams approv-ing Field's stand already have been received from the Philadelphia orchestra, the Chicago Symphony, Boston Symphony, Cleveland orchestra, National Symphony orchestra of Washington, D. C., Cincinnati Symphony, and the San Francisco and Minneapolis Symphonies.
