Dickie Passes Thru Lima On His Way East

Six-year-old Dickie Laswell of Springfield, Ill., who has fought a rare blood disease for eight months, passed thru Lima on a Pennsylvania train shortly after 9 p. m. Friday en route to New York for a series of newly developed treatments.

On his arrival in New York Saturday with his father, Richard T. Laswell, his first request was for a chance to see the salvaged liner Normandie, before he returns home.

Dickie and his father were met at the station by an ambulance crew from Beth David hospital, where the child will be treated for a rare form of lymphatic leukemia.

As the blond boy, dressed in a blue marine uniform, was placed on a wheeled stretcher at Pennsylvania station, his father said that they had had "a fine trip, and Dickie is in good spirits."

"We had promised Dickie, at his own request, that he could see a battleship while he was here. Now he wants to see the Normandie." The father said he did not know how long the treatments, offered to Dickie by Joseph Stein, a trustee of Beth David hospital, would require.

Stein earlier in the week read in a New York newspaper about Dickie and his personal war bond campaign to "kick the Japs." He phoned the senior Laswell and said the hospital would transfer the boy here and pay for a series of newly-developed treatments for leukemia.
