ANNE SHIRLEY IS HEROINE IN "BOMBARDIER," AT THE SIGMA

Don Ameche And Gene Tierney Appeal To Many In "Heaven Can Wait," Showing At Quilna

Showing at the Majestic are "Journey Into Fear," with Orson Welles and Dolores del Rio, and "Rhythm of the Island," with Jane Frazee.


OHIO PILOT IS KILLED IN ARMY BOMBER CRASH

L. J. H. Rodolf of Tulsa, Okla., was the flier who saved himself, when his plane burned after a crash landing near Arlington, Colo.



DON AMECHE, GENE TIERNEY CAST IN NEW HIT AT QUILNA

Don Ameche celebrated his seventh anniversary in motion pictures by embarking on a role that promises to be the biggest break in a career of big breaks—the lead opposite Gene Tierney in Ernst Lubitsch's production of "Heaven Can Wait," the new Quilna Technicolor hit.

Just seven years ago Ameche had given up all hope of ever crashing motion pictures. Although he was one of the best known young dramatic actors in radio and had a nationwide audience, only one film company had registered interest in him. This interest faded rapidly after one look at the screen test he made. He was told bluntly by the studio that he was definitely not picture material.

Disappointed, Ameche returned to his Chicago apartment and decided to forget Hollywood. Several weeks later, on February 1, 1936, to be exact, his telephone rang and when he had hung up, Ameche was on his way back to Hollywood and a screen career. 20th Century-Fox had seen the test made for the film company and decided that the young actor had promising possibilities. He has remained with the same studio ever since.

In "Heaven Can Wait," at the Quilna theatre, Ameche plays his first role for Ernst Lubitsch—a real achievement in Hollywood. To be directed by the famed Lubitsch seems to inspire actors and actresses to outdo themselves. And, since this picture is in Technicolor it is an extra-special event. It is Lubitsch's first production before the color camera.
