NEW YORK- (U.P.) -As Henry Armstrong and Fritzie Zivic draw nearer to retirement, they are blossoming out as managersreadying others to take the punches that "can't hurt us."

These 30-year-old ex-champions are nearing the end of long careers, although each tackles a formidable opponent next week.

Armstrong, who arrived in New York Wednesday to meet Corp. Ray Robinson Aug. 27 said: "I'll scored, retire definitely Jan. 1."


I didn't like that game between Riley and the Badger Sports the other night no life in the game at all. Most of the fans went to sleep the ones that were awake went home.
