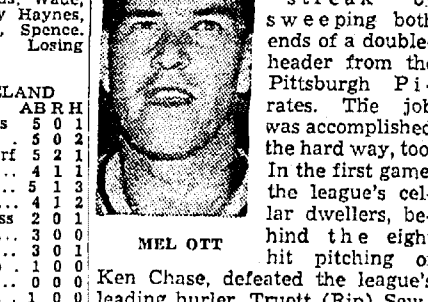

Drake Turns Down \$10,000 Grid Offer from Eagles Owner

CLEVELAND (U.P.)—The Cleveland Press said today that Johnny Drake, brilliant backfield ace for the Cleveland Rams, has turned down a comeback offer of \$10,000 to play 10 games for the Philadelphia Eagles during the forthcoming football season.

Drake, who resigned from the game before last season, is now personnel manager of the Thompson Products Co. plant in Detroit.

The press said that Alexis Thompson, youthful millionaire owner of the Philadelphia club, tried to lure Drake back into the game with one of the highest salary offers in the league's history.

Drake was offered a contract that called for only two weeks of pre-season training and specified that during the regular season all he had to do was report to the team for his Sunday games.
