Library Offers **Book Display** on Science

Collection Honors Aug. 26 Bicentennial of Antoine Lavoisier

Because Aug. 26 is the bicentennial of the birth of Antoine Lavoisier, the Madison Free library has arranged a display of books about the scientific discoveries made since this "father of modern chemistry" left what Ernest Trattner calls "an unforgettable heritage of precision which has illuminated the whole realm of modern sci-

Lavoisier spiked the cen-tury-old fallacy of phlogiston; He enunciated the principle of the conservation of matter; he collaborated on a simplified code of chemical nomenclature; he ran a successful experimental farm; he improved the manufacture of gunpowder. The accomplishments of this man who was guillotined during the French Revolution form interesting chapters in "Architects of Ideas," by Ernest Trattner; "Crucibles" by Bernard Jaffe; "Crusaders of Chemistry" by Jonathan Leonard, and "Famous Chem-ists" by Sir William Tilden.

It was to Lavoisier's Laboratory that Pierre Du Pont sent his son, Eutherie Irenee. When the revolution had driven the Du Ponts to the United States, they started what was to be one of America's largest chemical firms with the manufacture of a superior gun-powder as Irenee had learned to make it in the laboratory of Lavoisier. Many men have told the

history of this family, the most recent being William Dutton, whose "Du Pont; one hundred and forty years," was published in 1942. Marquis James, who has won Pulitzer prizes for his biographies, made a study called "Alfred I. Du Pont: the Family Rebel," J. K. Winkler's "Du Pont Dynasty" appeared in 1935, H. C. Engelbrecht devotes much space to the Du Pont Co. in "Merchants of Death." Varied products from the

Du Pont and similar research laboratories form a good share of the man-made materials that William Haynes discusses in "This Chemical Age." This book for the layman appeared in 1942. Mr. Haynes tells the dramatic stories of research, industrial developments, and production involved in making nylon stockings, plastic furniture, modern paint, synthetic rubber, synthetic oil, and perfume-to mention but a few miracles of modern chemistry.

Every newspaper reader abled Germany to subsist largely on "Ersatz" while attacking the rest of the world. A concise and thorough account of the important role of chemistry in feeding, clothing, sheltering, and protecting the soldier is outlined by Frederick Hessel in "Chemistry in Warfare," a 1940 publication. Christy Borth opens unex-

pected vistas for utilization of waste materials in his book Pioneers of Plenty." This vol-ume on what he calls "chemurgy" describes the work of creative chemists who work with hitherto unused raw materials. "George Washington Carver." by Rackham Holt, is more than a biography of an outstanding "chemurgist." It is the story of a brilliant and courageous Negro, and his contribution to American industry and wealth.

The Book Shelf

Powerful Americana

NUMBER ONE. By John Dos Passos. Houghton Mifflin Co. Bos-ton. \$2.50.

"When you try to find the people, always in the end it comes down to somebody." In this way Dos Passos introduces the descriptive passages which preface each of the five sections of his book - marvellously vivid pictures of "somebody" — ordinary Americans at work in the field or machine-shop or of-

Against this background the story proper concerns Chuck Crawford, "Number One" to his followers, the man who would represent and govern the people. He is the incarnation of a type; we have seen his kind. He capitalizes on his humble origin; he has mastered with superlative skill the art of talking in the language of ordinary people of the things they want to hear. "Every Man A Millionaire" is his slogan, and on his lips constantly the most sanguine and democratic promises, aimed especially to appeal to simple people; he is a master of "folksy" humor; he seems possessed of an all-embracing friendliness and good cheer.

He campaigns strenuously, taking in all the little towns, and exhibiting everywhere his pretty wife and two little boys. Betweenwhiles, out of the public gaze, he indulges in orgies of drink and women, puts through crooked oil deals. and finds it increasingly necessary to employ a body-

guard of plug-uglies. We watch Crawford's career through the eyes of his secretary and man - of - all-work, Tyler Spotswood, whose growing disillusionment, clouded by drink and exhaus-

love for Sue Ann, Crawford's wife, and climaxed by the posthumous letter he receives from his younger brother. This brother (Glenn Spotswood of "The Adventures of a Young Man") wrote before he died fighting for Spain, "Tyler, what I'd started to write you about was not letting them sell out too much of the for the people and by the people part of the old United States way:" Tyler's reaction to this letter marks a turning point in his attitude; the denouement comes when Chuck clears out, leaving Tyler to bear the rap from the discovered oil frauds.

The book is so good that one is sorry it is not still better. As a novel, it lacks solidity in the characters; it is too brief, with the consequence that actions seem insufficiently motivated; and the very method which is so successful in giving us the authentic atmosphere of the scenes described — the small fown rally, the hotels, the drinking bouts—may leave one feeling that too much has been entrusted to impressions of eye and ear, so that one is an observer at a play not thoroughly understood. The impression may, of course, be due to the density of this particular critic; but I shall still maintain that, as a novel, the book is skimpy. As a piece of Americana, as a document, it is highly successful, a vigorous, powerful, and valuable
