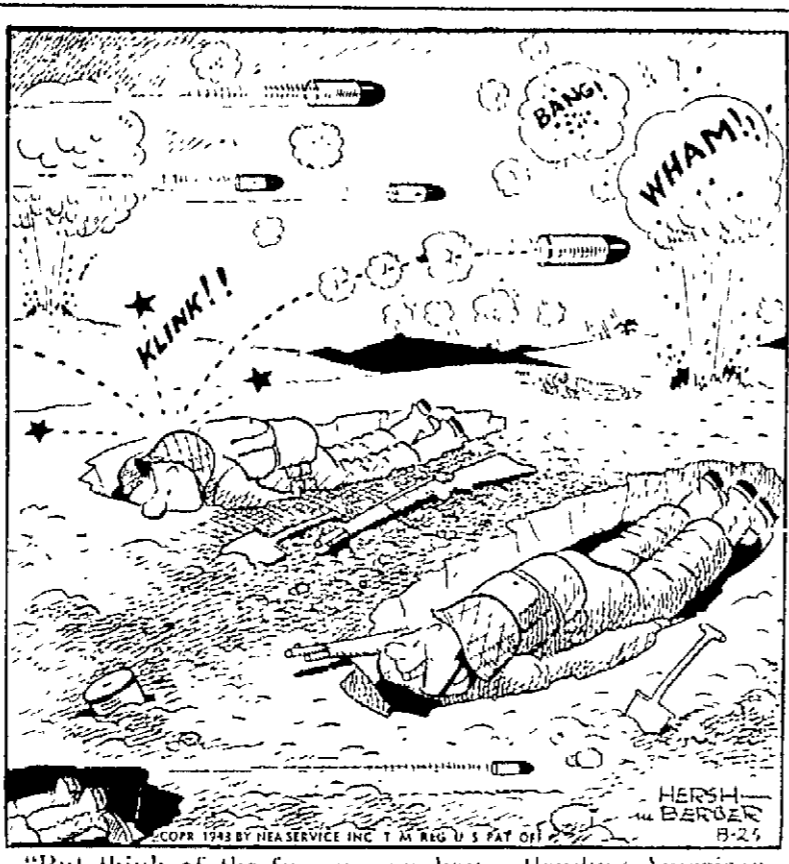
APPRECIATION PROVES MUTUAL

ARGENTINE AND BRITAIN SIGN MEAT CONTRACT

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Minister of Agriculture Diego Mason, in announcing a new British-Argentine meat contract, said today it was likely Great Britain was acting as a purchasing agent for the Allied Nations to take as much of Argentine's exportable surplus meat as shipping facilities will permit.

Making his announcement in a speech at the national cattle show, Mason indicated that under the contract the insistence of Argentine livestock raisers on a price increase had been satisfied, at least in part.

He said the new contract provides "reasonable prices which take into consideration the value of the produce" and declared that negotiations touched a "happy conclusion." He did not discuss the exact date to be paid.

LONDON, Aug. 21.—(AP)—A Reuters dispatch from Madrid and today that a Spanish Red cross plane, carrying 25 wounded soldiers, was shot down by German fighters.

It was the first plane to be shot down since the start of the war in Spain, according to the Reuters dispatch.

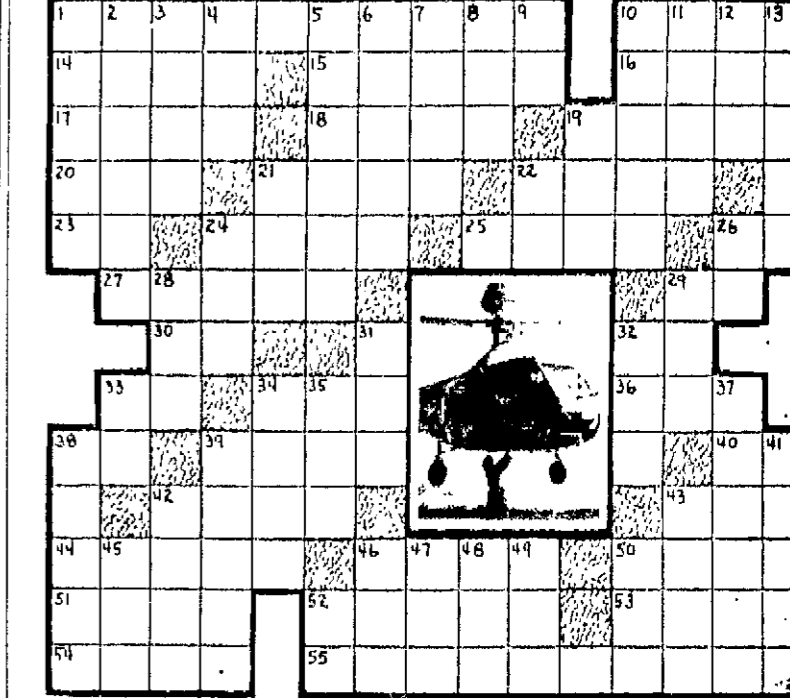
