GREEN SPEAKER AT OHIO STATE LABOR SESSION

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 25 — (INS) — A. F. L. President William Green was to arrive in Columbus today to address the 600 delegates attending the fifty-ninth annual convention of the Ohio Federation of Labor.

It will be the one-time Ohio legislator's first appearance before a Buckeye convention since he addressed the 1939 O. F. L. meeting in Akron.

Edward L. Keenan, Ohio manpower director, told the delegates that the nation's armed forces will take an additional 2,000,000 men next year, adding:
