Standing over the vessel's prow, in the so-called "pulpit," is a man with a harpoon. He is the one who must do the "spearing" when the schooner comes within close range of a swordfish.

If the harpoon strikes home, the end comes off and a line about 600 feet long begins to play out. The line is fastened to a cask, and the cask is tossed into the water. Then the fish is allowed to swim about until it is tired, or should be tired.

Each schooner carries one or more small boats known as "dories." After the cask is pitched in the water, two or three men follow it in a dory. It is their duty to haul the swordfish up.

There is some danger to men in a small boat. The swordfish may

turn around and drive its sword right through the bottom! One case of the kind is on record for 1936. Two men left the schooner and boarded a skiff to
