

Ruthless Dreams Of Japan Seen In New Ohio Picture

"Behind The Rising Sun" Opens Engagement Friday; Boston Blackie Hunts Jewel Thieves In Lyric Hit

A vivid and memorable picture of modern Japan and its ruthless dreams of world conquest is given in "Behind the Rising Sun," which comes to the Ohio on Friday, Margo, Tom Neal, J. Carrol Naish and Gloria Holden head the cast of the unusual drama. "Watch on the Rhine," ends a successful engagement on Thursday.

Ann Savage, beautiful starlet, plays the leading role opposite Chester Morris in "After Midnight With Boston Blackie," new Lyric hit. The film is the latest in the Blackie series and shows the popular rogue stalking the darkness for stolen jewels—and kisses. "Six Gun Gospel," with Johnny Mack Brown, completes the bill.

A thrilling action story of the sharpshooting Army Air Corps gunners who blast the enemy ships out of the sky, forms the basis of the new State hit, "Aerial Gunners." Also showing is "Get Going," starring Grace McDonald and Robert Paige.

Opening Friday at the Drive In theatre will be "Crystal Ball," a story dealing with fortune telling. Paulette Goddard and Ray Milland have the lead roles in this romantic comedy. "Silver Skates" will show thru Thursday.

The Majestic will present "Hi, Buddy," and "Heart of the Golden West," commencing Friday.

Nearing the close of its run at the Sigma is "This is the Army," a great Irving Berlin musical production. The thousands of Lima and area residents who have seen the picture term it one of the finest pictures ever made in Hollywood. Many favorites of the entertainment world are in the cast.

Showing thru Friday afternoon at the Quilna will be "Bomber's Moon," a story dealing with a fighting, flying Yank, and a brave Russian girl. George Montgomery and lovely Annabella have principal roles. Lupe Velez cuts up in the co-feature, "Redhead From Manhattan." Beginning Friday night, "Good Luck, Mr. Yates," will show.

OHIO The real reason for Japan's sneak attack on Pearl Harbor and its place in the Island Kingdom's dreams of world conquest, are the basis of the absorbing human story of "Behind the Rising Sun," first feature film to reveal Nip war aims.

It opens Friday at the Ohio. The sensational picture weaves a dramatic romance and many authentic glimpses of Japanese life into its development, which centers around the growth of militarism in the Mikado's kingdom and its results on the lives of six persons, three Americans and three Japs.

One of the Japs knows what is coming, doesn't like the idea, but realizes he is helpless, and that to oppose the growing tide would be fatal. He persuades his son, a likeable young Cornell graduate, to go in the Jap army and become a part of the new order. The tragic results of this move motivate much of the breathless action of the plot, and lead to its stirring climax when, to atone for his mistake, the father endeavors to rescue his American friends from torture and death.

J. Carrol Naish and Tom Neal play the Jap father and son, and Margo enacts the latter's sweet heart. Robert Ryan, Don Douglas and Gloria Holden are cast as the trio of Americans.

LYRIC While many an object lesson may be gained from a motion picture, just the opposite may sometimes happen. To prevent any such occurrence, Chester Morris made a recommendation during the filming of "After Midnight with Boston Blackie" that was thoroughly agreed upon by director Lew Landers.

One scene in the film, now at the Lyric theatre, shows Morris in the title role, making an impression of a lock with a piece of chewing gum so that he can have a key made. The star does it, of course, to help a friend. But so that no youngster will learn the fine art of making keys with wax or gum impressions, Morris asked if the scene could merely be a suggestive one. The director said yes, and now the picture shows Chester Morris chewing gum.

Dear Editor: As the time-change headache again bobs up, here is a timely suggestion:

Adopt "Greenwich Meridian Time" for the entire U. S. A.

Perhaps I'm wrong, but I've always had the impression that our earth's daily revolution on its axis had something to do with our conception of time and that our time-pieces were set in accordance with our relative position to the sun (solar time) to wit: when the sun is directly over the meridian nearest you it's 12 o'clock noon solar time.

It was anticipating his arrival, somewhat, when Ohio adopted Eastern standard time, but when the powers-that-be advance our clocks an additional hour it almost seems as if they were trying to get even with us for a previous slip-up.

In this vicinity our clocks already are nearly two hours ahead of "Old Sol," so why not go all-the-way and get a six hour start on him? If it's essential to our war effort that we arise and get to work in the dark, why not get up at midnight, do our essential work, and have six extra hours of daylight at our disposal?

At any rate, (as long as we don't depend on the sun for our time), it might be less confusing to have one time—"G. M. T." for the nation and it would bring us up-to-date with our British Allies.

OHIO SEEKS TO BOOST ACREAGE OF SOFT WHEAT

COLUMBUS, Sept. 9.—(UP)—A campaign to increase the acreage of soft winter wheat in Ohio will be launched at a meeting of representatives of grain, feed and millers associations and of boards of trade.

Ohio's acreage of soft winter wheat has shrunk from 2,544,000 acres in 1937 to 1,644,000 acres in 1943. W. W. Cummings, secretary of the Ohio Grain, Mill and Feed Dealers' assn., said. Under the allotment plan this year, he said, acreage will be increased about one per cent to only 1,650,000 acres.

Other states were allotted larger increases, he said, and an appeal for an increased allotment in acreage will be presented to the Ohio State Agriculture Adjustment Administration and to Washington.
