Jimmy Dykes, manager of the Chicago White Sox, will be Bill Stern's guest on the Sports Newsreel, Friday at 10:30 p. m. (EWT) over WEA. The broadcast will originate in Chicago because Stern starts the football season Saturday by broadcasting the Purdue-Great Lakes football game.

Romance and the official opening of school are the main topics of "The Parker Family" over Station WJZ on Friday at 8:15 p. m. EWT. Young Richard Parker learns that he won't be in the same official class as Louise but his arch-rival for her affections, Archibald Williamson, will have that luck. He petitions Ma and Pa Parker to see if they can't influence the school principal to do something about it. In the meantime he meets a new girl, Lola Weston, and learns that she will be in his class. That pleases him immensely. Still further switches in the plot find Lola and Louise as roommates and Richard and Archibald sharing the same class. Laugh lines are fast and furious but it ends in a blaze of happiness.

A musical cloudburst, consisting of five songs about rain, will be Dr. Frank Black's popular music feature, on his Friday night concert series with Lucille Manners and Ross Graham at 8 p. m. EWT over Station WEA. The medley consists of "Singing in the Rain," "September in the Rain," "April Showers," "Butterflies in the Rain" and "Till the Clouds Roll By."

NEW FILMS APPROVED BY OHIO CENSORS

COLUMBUS, Sept. 17 — (UP) — The war-torn love of Ingrid Bergman and Gary Cooper in Hollywood's version of "For Whom the Bell Tolls" will reach Ohio movie audiences as the producers intended, unspoiled by censor's scissors, State Education Director Kenneth A. Ray indicated today.

Ray, as head of the film censorship division which approves all movies shown publicly in Ohio, sat with the censors as Ernest Hemingway's much-discussed story of the Spanish civil war unfolded — technicolor and all — for nearly three hours.

Whispers of "this is it" began as crop-haired Maria (Bergman) and Roberto (Cooper) declared their love and huddled together beneath blankets on a war and snow-swept mountainside.

But the audience believed that Hollywood had handled the book's vicious prose with delicacy and tact and a shrewd eye on the office of Will Hays.

IMPRISONMENT OF LIMA SERGEANT IS CONFIRMED

PUTNAM SCOUTS GIVEN AWARDS

17 Boys From Ottawa And Pandora Troops Advanced At Honor Court

(Lima News Bureau) OTTAWA, Sept. 17—One of the largest courts of honor ever held in the Putnam-Sen area, Boy Scouts of America, was held Tuesday night in the scout headquarters in Ottawa.

A total of 17 boys from the Ottawa and Pandora troops were advanced while 124 merit badges were awarded to 20 boys in three troops.

John Smart, field executive for the area, was here to make the awards. Also taking part in the program were H. R. Groves of Findlay, chairman of the district advancement committee, and Ernest Manchester, chairman of the district senior court committee.

All the officials of the Putnam Scout committee were present and assisted in making the court of honor a success. The Continental troop was the third one with boys receiving awards. Troops from Miller City and Columbus Grove attended but did not have any members ready for awards at this court.

Five members of the Ottawa troop were advanced to Life Scout rank. They are Herbert Oglesbee, Jr., Rudy Roof, Jr., Jack Kohle, Thomas Unverferth and Allan Guller.

Five from this troop also were advanced to Star Scout. They are George Kahle, William Labadie, James Anspach, James Walker and Richard Laudeck, Jr. Four were advanced to second class. They are Paul Wilkinson, Robert Thompson, Charles Kahle and Guy Corkwell. A tenderfoot badge was awarded to Robert Barber of the same troop.

James Diller, Mark Diller and Charles Krohn of the Pandora troop were advanced to first class rank.

ST. MARYS LAGS IN BOND DRIVE

(Special To The Lima News) ST. MARYS, Sept. 17—St. Marys has sold only about one-fourth of its quota of \$400,000 War Bonds up to date. It was announced here Thursday. In the county the percentage of sales is about the same, it was reported.

Sales have lagged, due partly to the fact that the campaign did not get under way until this week in some of the communities.

The village of Minster is the only community reported to have gone over the top in its bonds sales up to date. That village has bought more than \$200,000 worth of bonds, double its quota.
