

W. C. Fields Meets Charlie, This Time Without A Saw

Phil Baker's "Take It Or Leave It" With Its \$64 Questions Starts New Series On Sunday Night

W. C. Fields, the red-nosed comedian who once threatened to cut Charlie McCarthy into a set of venetian blinds, will be Edgar Bergen's guest Sunday at 8 p. m. (EWT) over W. EAF. This will be W. C.'s first radio appearance this year.

Currently enjoying one of the highest audience listening ratings since it started on the air in April, 1940, Phil Baker's "Take It Or Leave It" has been handed a renewal by the sponsor effective Sunday and will continue to be heard over Station WABC at 10 p. m. The Sunday series is so popular that Baker's "Would You Like to Try the \$84 Question?" has become a standard catchphrase throughout the country.

FIRE DEFENSE TO BE STUDIED BY LIMA CORPS

Fire Defense will be the subject of the classes to be conducted Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights at Central high school for the Citizens Defense Corps of Lima, it was announced Saturday by Howard W. Scheuerman, chief training officer.

Theodore Hover, local technician, and E. L. Huber, chemistry teacher, are instructors for the classes. Motion pictures will be used in these classes to show the construction and methods of handling and fighting incendiary bombs.

These films are entitled, "Incendiary Bombs," "Defense Against Incendiaries," "Handling Incendiaries" and "Fighting the Fire Bomb."

These classes are primarily for defense corps members but provide an opportunity for all defense workers to refresh themselves on the training they previously received, Scheuerman pointed out.

The classes will begin at 8 p. m. next week. The third week of the series of classes will be held the following week in charge of Scheuerman and Sharon Bresler.

LIONS CLUB TO RAISE FUNDS FOR PURCHASE OF "SEEING EYE DOG"

The Lima Lions club announced Saturday that its board of directors has authorized the sponsorship and purchase of a Leader Dog for a local worthy blind person as an addition to the club's work of aiding the sightless carrying on by the Lions' Sight Conservation Committee under the chairmanship of Harry Stuck.

In its effort to achieve the new goal, the club has increased its activity in sales tax collections with the idea of creating a fund for the purchase of the Leader Dog.

The first week's collections have amounted to 16,732 stamps which represent \$742.80 in tax, \$25,000 in retail sales, and a cash value of \$22.28. The club now has over \$100 to its credit in the tax stamp fund, and in addition to this, the club members have agreed to turn over all of their stamp receipts to help pay for the Leader Dog, which will cost in excess of \$600.

The dog is being purchased from the Leader Dog League of Rochester, Mich., which thus far has placed in service approximately 100 Leader Dogs in the past four years. Lima citizens will recall the demonstration sponsored by the Lima Lions club and staged by Al Purnell, representative of the Leader Dog League about two years ago before all public and parochial school children during "Sight Education Week."

The Lima blind person to whom the Leader Dog is assigned will be required to attend the Leader Dog League School of Instruction in the near future. The schooling provides a four weeks' course with a pre-trained dog that will share graduation honors with its new owner. After graduation, the recipient of the dog will return to Lima with the dog to resume normal activities with the aid of the newly acquired aid.

In order to aid tax stamp collections for the new project, the Lions club has installed receptacles in several stores and prominent locations with the result that stamps have been provided by persons residing in localities as far as Celina and other surrounding towns.
