Soldier Has to Hitchhike 200 Miles to Be Married

PORTLAND, Ore. (U.P.)—By garbage truck, ambulance, and jalopy Pvt. William R. Lewis hitchhiked to his wedding while the bride and the assembled guests fidgeted in the church and the organ played on and on.

An unromantic sergeant gave Lewis his pass so late that he missed the last bus from his camp to Portland, 200 miles away, and here it was his wedding day.

Undaunted, Lewis raced to the highway and thumbed a ride on the first vehicle going his way. It was a garbage truck.

At about that time the rest of the wedding party and the guests were assembling in a Portland church. The candles were lighted; the organist began to play; everybody was ready but the bridegroom.

Fifty minutes after the wedding was supposed to start the minister received a telephone call from Lewis, who asked everyone to sit tight and give him a little time.

While the minister was announcing that there would be a slight delay, Lewis was abandoning the garbage truck which had stalled with a flat tire. His next ride was in an ambulance, but it wasn't going all the way to Portland.

So Lewis got out and sent a telegram to the minister, who announced to the wedding congregation that the bridegroom now had reached the suburban town of Gresham.

Lewis next got a ride in a jalopy with a top speed of 18 miles an hour. Then his father, who had driven toward the camp in the hope of finding the hitchhiker, picked him up and sped to the church.

The candles were burned out; the organist was weary; and some of the guests had gone home. But Geraldine Morris, the bride, was still there.
