

Hollywood's New Musical Production Comes To Ohio

Hollywood's tune-ful, star-full musical production, "Thank You Lucky Stars," commences an engagement at the Ohio on Friday. Many big name stars will be seen "Hers to Hold," Deanna Durbin hit, ends Thursday.

Opening Thursday at the Lyric are "The West Side Kid," with Donald Barry, Henry Hull, and Dale Evans; and "Border Buckaroos," thrilling fast-moving western drama.

LYRIC "The West Side Kid" now appearing at the Lyric theatre, is one of the most interesting pictures seen here for a long time, and grips the attention right from the first reel. Old Sam Winston, millionaire, is so disgusted with the way his wife and family are behaving, he is so heartbroken at their lack of affection for him, in spite of the way he lavished money and love on them, that he hires a young gangster, Johnny April to "bump him off"—painlessly, if possible—in that way hoping to escape his misery. Johnny, the more he sees of the "upper strata" of society, the more he dislikes them, and during his short association, lets them have his ideas of life right from the shoulder, and to say that his badly phrased but very expressive language causes consternation in the family is putting it very mildly. Each word explodes like a bombshell, and to make matters still more complicated, falls in love with old Sam's daughter, Gloria.

PLANS STUDIED TO AVERT SHOE BUYING RUSH

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (UP) — Ration officials hope to forestall another mad scramble for shoes when ration Stamp No. 18 expires Oct. 31.

They are studying methods of averting rush buying such as occurred when the first shoe stamp expired, it was disclosed today. One proposed change would create an overlapping period in which both old and new stamps would be valid.

Officials also have considered indefinite extension of the valid period of Stamp 18 and designating stamps for a year's ration of shoes with no expiration date for individual stamps.

After the last ration stamp expired, merchants complained that the flood of sales disrupted normal trade and resulted in non-essential buying to avoid loss of the stamp.

Airplane Stamp No. 1 will be the first shoe stamp in ration book 3.
