Thursday Carries Name of Norse Thunder God

NOW WE come to Thursday, the "Day of Thor." It is the fifth day of the week, and was named in honor of the Norse god of thunder.

Thousands of Norsemen settled in Great Britain after the Anglo-Saxons reached the island. These Norsemen gave some of their words to the English language, and it seems plain that they gave us Thursday.

The present spelling of Thursday is close to the old spelling of "Thor's day" or "Thorsday."

If one of those Norsemen could come back to life, here are things about which he might tell us:

"Thor is the god of thunder. He is the owner of a huge hammer, and when it is drawn back and thrown, it makes lightning flash and thunder roar. The hammer is of a magical kind. It comes back to Thor's hand after he throws it."

"A chariot drawn by two goats is used by Thor as he travels about the sky. The chariot is made of brass and the sound of the thunder."

"Thor got his magic hammer in an odd way. One of the other gods, Loki, cut off the long, golden hair of Thor's wife, who was named Sif.

"That deed filled Thor with anger, and he rushed to grasp Loki and punish him. Loki said, 'If you do not harm me, I will get new golden hair for your wife, as beautiful as what she had before.'

"Thor let him go, and Loki quickly went to a dwarf who was noted for his skill. The dwarf set to work with a will and soon made thin golden strands which were like hair. These were placed on Sif's head, and grew as well as if they had been real hair."

"To make sure that the thunder god would not be angry with him, Loki also got from the dwarf a magic hammer. This he gave to Thor, who used it from that time onward to make thunder."

Many other stories were told about Thor, and the Norsemen looked on him as one of the greatest gods, hardly second to Odin, or Woden.

Among the ancient Romans, the fifth day of the week was the "Day of Jove" or "Day of Jupiter." Jove and Jupiter were names used for the same god, the most powerful of those the Romans worshiped.
