Uncle Ray's Corner
 DURING a visit in Shanghai, several years ago, I had lunch as the guest of a young Chinese business man. During that meal, I tried to eat with "chopsticks," and it is the first time I can remember making that effort.

To hold two sticks in one hand, and to use them to place food in your mouth, is not a simple thing. Later I made some progress in the art, but on that day I could not get those two sticks to do their work in the right way.

My Chinese friend told me it would be "polite" to hold the small bowls, in which the food was served, close to my mouth. I tried that and got along a little better, but at length I laid down the sticks and used a porcelain spoon, which was brought to the table with the soup course.

When a Chinese goes into mourning because of the death of a relative, he stops using chopsticks until his time of mourning comes to an end. During that period he picks up his meat in his fingers!

Going back to the set-up which I have spoken, I must tell you that it was served in the middle of the meal, not at the start. It was mushroom soup, and I spoke of its fine flavor. My host said, "I will show you what gives it the good flavor." With those words, he took something from out of the pot from which the soup had been poured. It was the foot of a chicken!

"Chinese cooks," he said, "know a hundred ways to cook chicken."

The spoon was meant for the soup, but in other courses of the meal I found that it would do very well to pick up the cubes of meat. Four or five kinds of meat were served at that meal, and each kind was cut into cubes perhaps one-third of an inch square.

Chopsticks have been used in China for time untold. Some of them are made from wood, others from bone or ivory. They take the place of forks.

The Chinese often give "signs" by the way they handle their chopsticks. For example, a person can show that he wants to leave the table by laying the sticks across his bowl.

When a Chinese goes into mourning because of the death of a relative, he stops using chopsticks until his time of mourning comes to an end. During that period he picks up his meat in his fingers!
