Reception Center Centralization Planned

CHICAGO (U.P.)—Maj. Gen. H. S. Aarand, commanding general of the sixth service command, Wednesday announced plans for discontinuing the use of Camp Grant, Ill., and Ft. Custer, Mich., as reception centers by the establishment of a single reception center at Ft. Sheridan, Ill.

If authorized by army officers as Washington, the change will become effective about Nov. 1, he said. This would mean that all men drafted in the three states of the sixth service command — Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin — would be sent to Ft. Sheridan for their first taste of army life.

Formerly there were three reception centers in the command. Last summer the one at Scott Field, Ill., was closed. Since then Negroes and a few white men have been sent to Ft. Custer and most of the white men to Camp Grant.

"Other changes within the service command are contemplated," Aarand said, "but details must be withheld until we receive final approval of the transfer."

Witness Transfer Refused

CHICAGO (U.P.) — Federal Judge Philip L. Sullivan refused Wednesday to permit removal of William Johnson, Chicago contractor, to Sheboygan, Wis., where he is sought as a material witness at bankruptcy proceedings of the Republic Match Co.

U. S. Commissioner Edwin K. Walker issued a writ of removal last week on an order from Federal Judge F. Ryan Duffy of Wisconsin, describing Johnson as secretary-treasurer of the Republic Co.

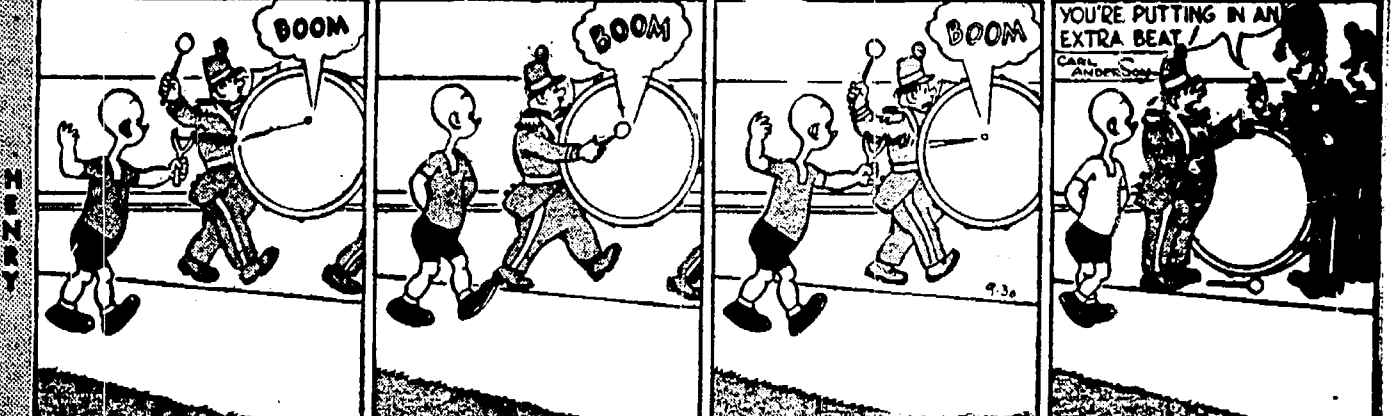
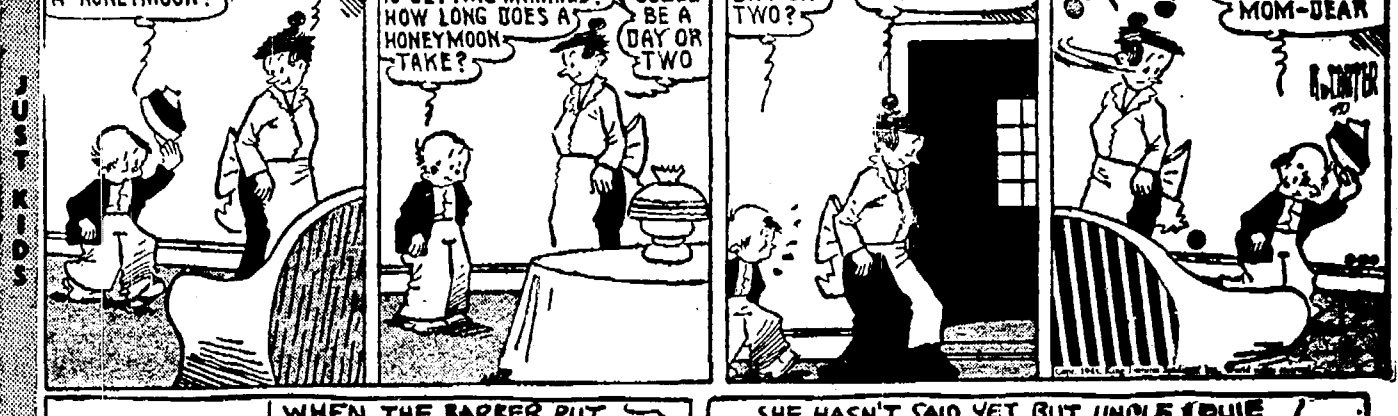
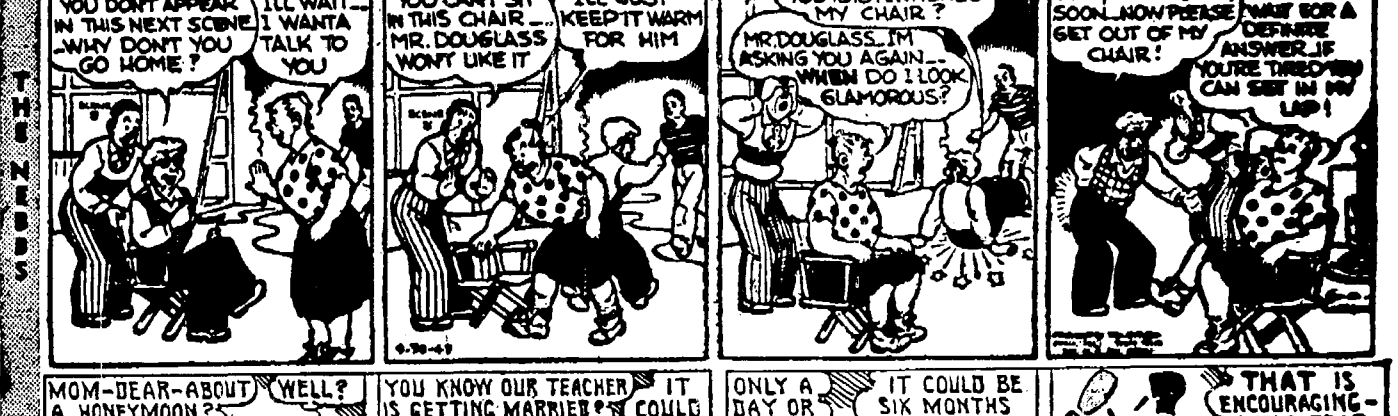
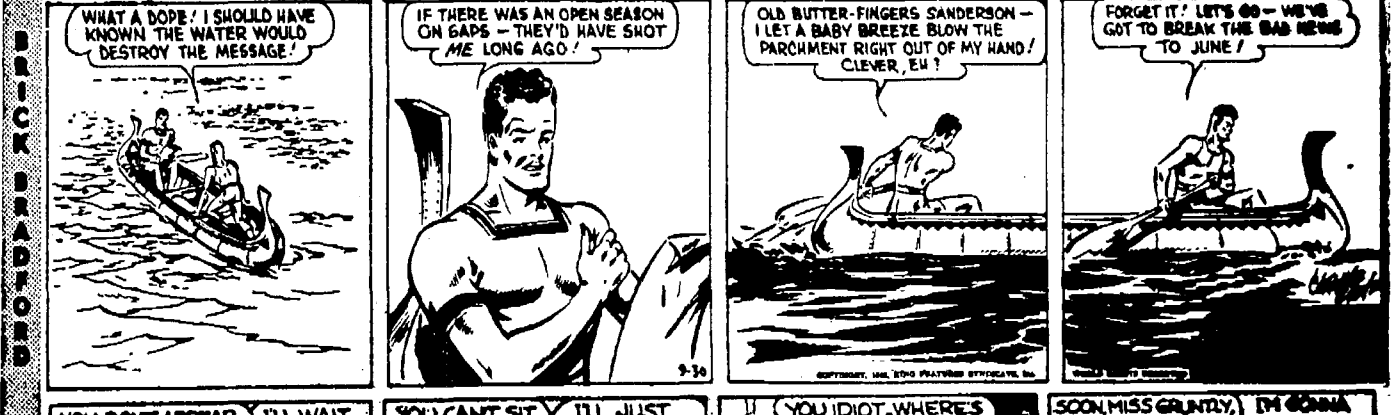
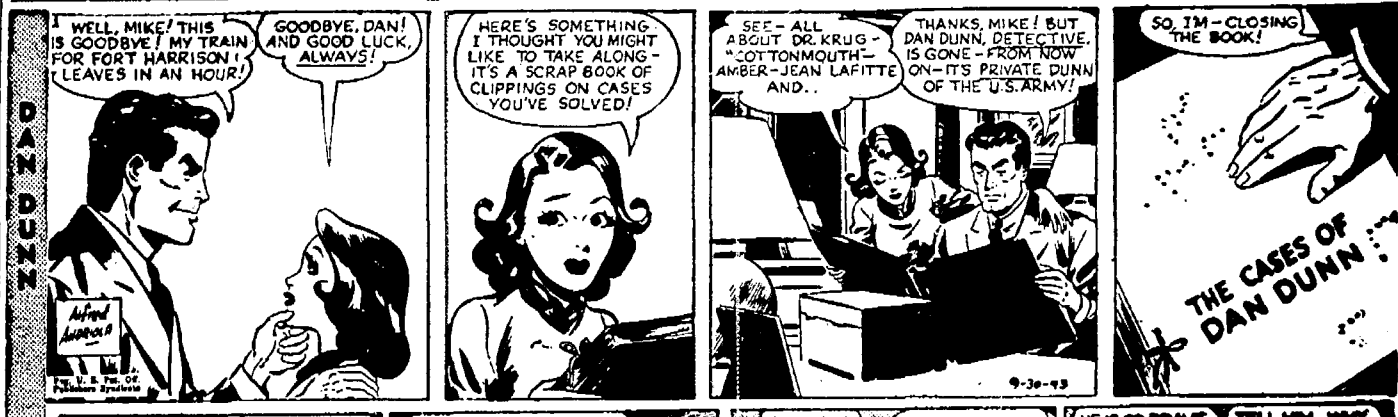
Judge Sullivan ruled that the order violated procedure in failing to include proof that Johnson held that office. Johnson has denied holding the position.

Uncle Ray's Corner

Peking, or Peiping, is Old Center of Chinese Power

CHINA has a city with two names—Peiping and Peking. Peiping was adopted as a new name 14 years ago, but the old name has not been forgotten. For hundreds of years the city was called Peking and was the capital of China.

This great Chinese city was founded at about the same time as Rome. More than 2,600 years have rolled by since it first became a center of life.

About 1,200 years ago, the city was captured by an army of Tartars, and later it fell into the hands of the Mongols. The two most famous of the Mongol rulers were Jenghiz Khan and his grandson, Kublai Khan.

Kublai Khan was on the throne when Marco Polo made his trip into eastern Asia. He visited the palace of the khan, and became an officer of the government.

Before Columbus sailed across the Atlantic, the Mongols lost their power. Chinese armies defeated them in battle, and a Chinese emperor took over the city. He seems to have been the first to call the place "Peking." The name means "Northern Capital."

The Chinese held control of Peking until the Manchus invaded their country. The Manchus became masters of the empire in 1643, just three centuries ago. Their emperors used Peking as their capital until the present century.

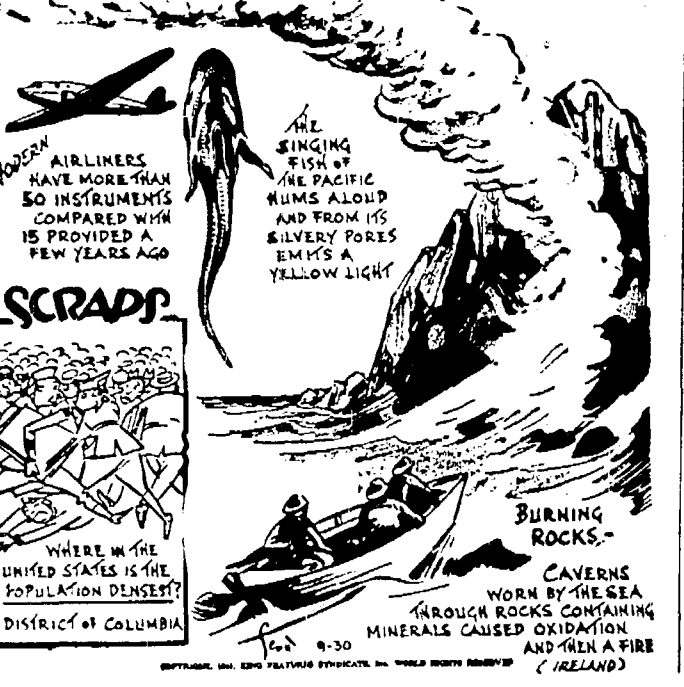
From that long and changing history, we might expect the city to show signs of the past—and it does. One part of it is known as the "Tartar City" and there are 20 feet high and are wide enough for four automobiles to pass along the top. They are made of bricks, stone and earth and are cut by five gateways. There are other walls with a height of from 20 to 50 feet.

A different section of Peking, or Peiping, is called the "Forbidden City." In this part the Manchu emperors had their palaces. The common people were forbidden to enter the area, and few white persons saw it until after the year 1900.
