Lamb Increased CHICAGO __(U.P)_ Production of dressed beef, veal, and lamb increased 81,000,000 pounds in September over the previous month's output, the American Meat institute reported Friday, but total production of all meats remained at approximately the same

mained at approximately the same level as in August.

Beef, veal, and lamb production increased 12, 24, and 10 per cent respectively, but an 8 per cent decrease in dressed pork and a 10 per cent reduction in lard brought the total down, the report showed.
