Mrs. V. P. McGraw, Lima Day Nursery consultant, made this announcement Saturday as she disclosed the city's four Day Nursery units now are caring for a total of 95 children.

Facilities for the additional 50 children have been made available at the new North-West Nursery, located in the old Moose home, North and West-sts.

At present, only 19 children of working mothers are being cared for at the new nursery. The only requirement for mothers having their children taken care of at this. convenient location is that the mother must be employed. Where the mother works, doesn't matter, Mrs. McGraw said.
