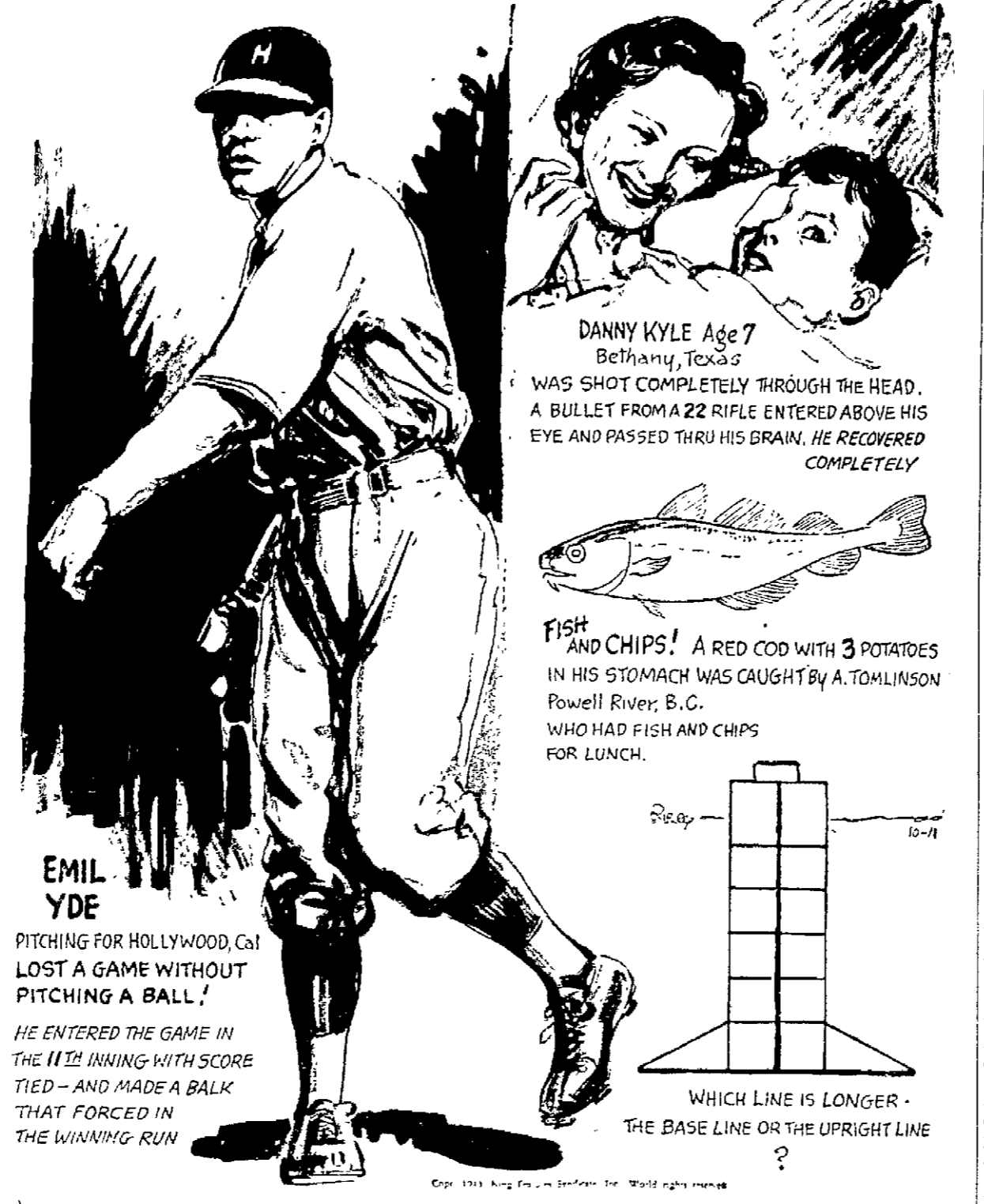

RECEIPTS FROM PUTNAM-CO FAIR SET NEW RECORD

OTTAWA, Oct. 11—The 88th annual Putnam-co Fair came to a close Saturday with all premiums paid and receipts hitting a new high for the exposition. Unofficial figures released on the receipts from sale of gate, standstill and automobile tickets during the last four days of the fair showed Monday that these totaled \$12,553 for a gain of \$2,806 over the 1942 total. The attendance hit about 20,000 Saturday with the receipts reaching \$3,641.20. This was a gain of \$320.75 over the Saturday receipts of 1942. Final official figures on the receipts of the fair which probably will approach the \$20,000 mark when concession rental and race entries are added to the gate receipts will be announced at the annual meeting of the sponsoring organization, the Putnam-co Agricultural Society, Saturday, Dec. 4, in Ottawa.
