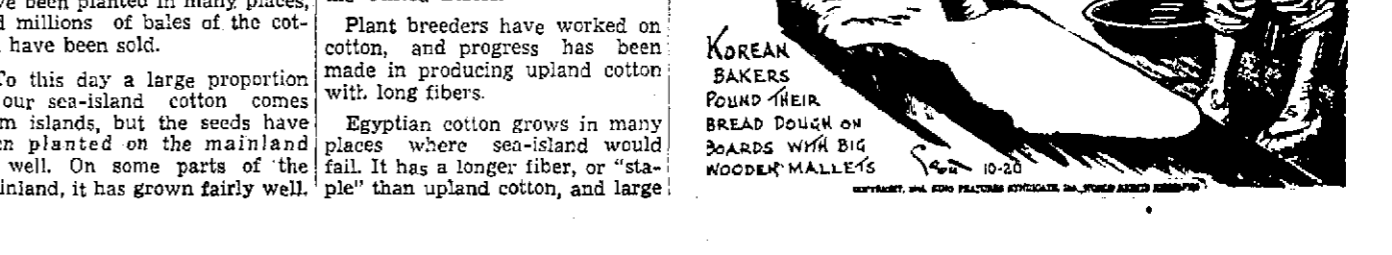
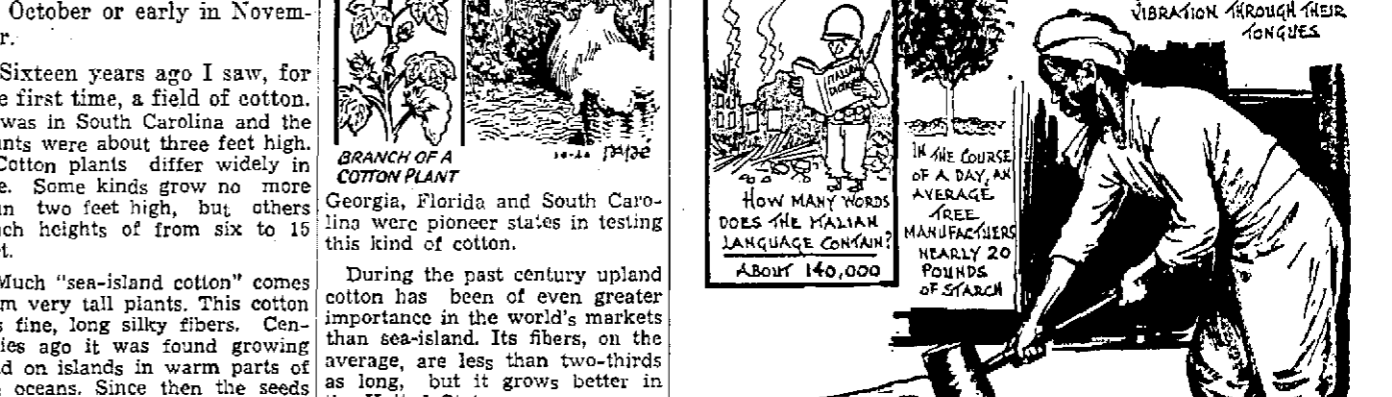
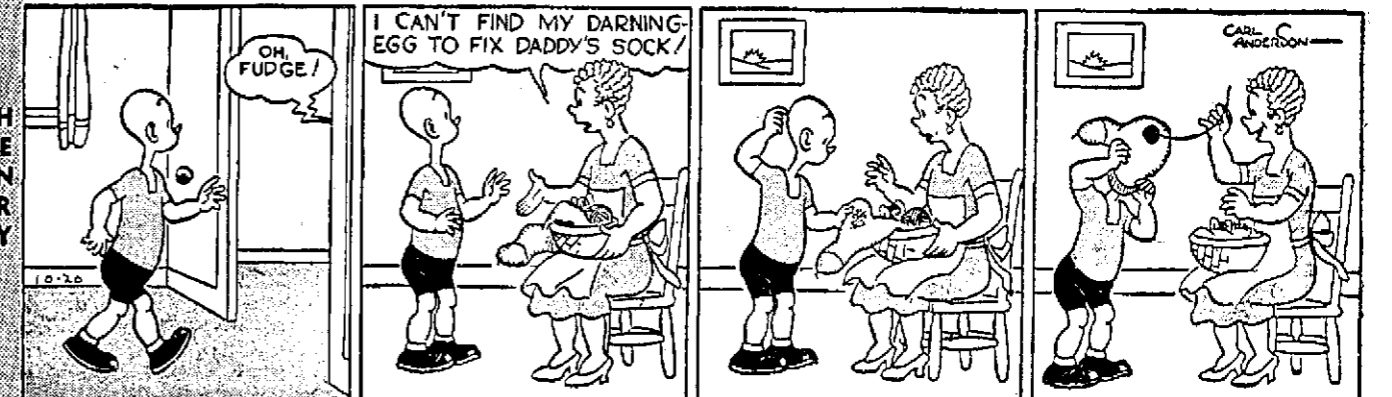
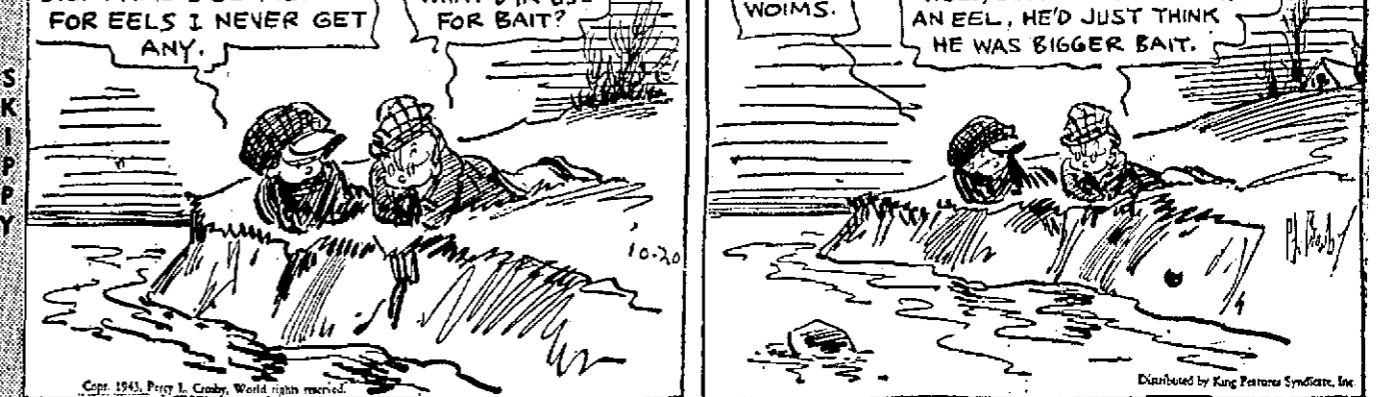
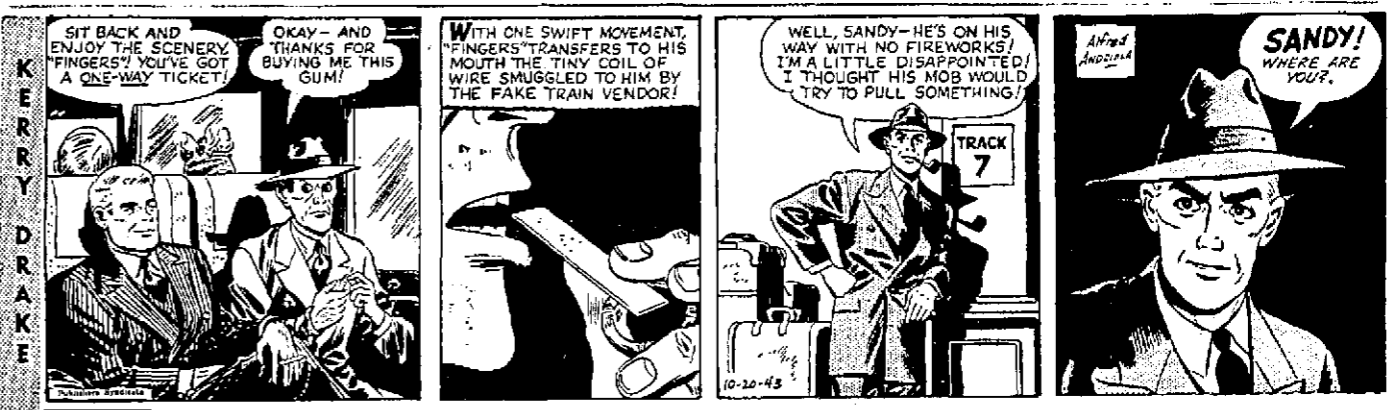
**Farmers to Get Protein Feed**  
**500 Cars of Meal on Way to Wisconsin**  
(State Journal Washington Bureau) WASHINGTON—Rep. La Vern R. Dilweg (D-Green Bay) announced today that 500 carloads of linseed and soybean meal have reached Chicago en route to principal points in Wisconsin, particularly the eighth congressional district, for distribution among dairymen.  
Wisconsin farm leaders have asserted for some time that they will be unable to meet production goals unless additional supplementary cattle rations are made available.  
(State agricultural experts told Dilweg said he had "won his fight" to secure protein feeds for Wisconsin dairy herds, and added that if the 500 carload supply is not sufficient he would ask that more be sent to Wisconsin. He said that many of his constituents had complained that since the Commodity Credit Corp. allowed food processors to purchase proteins they were unable to secure them, and that processors were using them in mixed feed, the price of which was regarded as prohibitive.

**Uncle Ray's Corner**

**UNITED STATES LEADS WORLD IN COTTON CROP**  
RIGHT now the cotton picking season is drawing toward a close on this continent. Picking starts in summer, often in July. In most places it is finished by the end of October or early in November.

Sixteen years ago I saw, for the first time, a field of cotton. It was in South Carolina and the plants were about three feet high. Cotton plants differ widely in size. Some kinds grow no more than two feet high, but others reach heights of from six to 15 feet.

Much "sea-island cotton" comes from very tall plants. This cotton has fine, long silky fibers. Centuries ago it was found growing wild on islands in warm parts of the oceans. Since then the seeds have been planted in many places, and millions of bales of the cotton have been sold.

To this day a large proportion of our sea-island cotton comes from plants, but the seeds have been planted on the mainland as well. On some parts of the mainland, it has grown fairly well.

South America, good-sized crops are produced in Brazil and Peru. (For GENERAL INTEREST section of your scrapbook.)
