Society Alters Constitution

Curators Reelect All Officers

Replacing the constitution of the Wisconsin State Historical society which has been in effect since Dec. 16, 1897, the board of curators of the society unanimously adopted a new constitution at the annual business meeting Thursday in the historical society museum.

All officers were reelected for the coming year, and 12 members of the board of directors, whose terms expire this year, were reelected for three-year terms.

The new constitution, simplifying the old constitution but making few major changes, was made necessary by the continued growth of the society, said Dr. Edward P. Alexander, superintendent of the society, who drew up the new constitution with the aid of the society's advisory board after a two-year study.

Under the new constitution, the superintendent is henceforth to be known as the director; honorary and corresponding memberships have been abolished; the machinery for amending the constitution

has been simplified and may be effected by a two-thirds vote of the board of curators at any annual meeting, and the transfer from annual to life membership has been simplified.

In addition, a seven-man executive committee is established which replaces the former advisory board and the finance committee; private funds of the society are briefly described in a general article instead of writing the full restrictions upon each fund in a separate by-law, and the board of curators is authorized to reduce by 25 per cent the annual dues of the members who also hold memberships in auxiliary historical societies throughout the state.

William A. Titus, Fond du Lac, was reelected president of the society. Other officers re-elected were L. M. Hank, Madison, treasurer, and Vice-pres, William L. Evans, Green Bay; Robert N. Richardson, Beloit; Albert H. Sanford, La Crosse; Peter L. Scanlan, Prairie du Chien, and Edward B. Steensland, Madison.

Members of the board of curators reelected were Frederick C. Best, Oconomowoc; John M. Dodd, Ashland; Matthew S. Dudgeon, Milwaukee; John C. Gregory, Milwaukee; John L. Grindell, Platteville; Adolph R. Janeky, Racine; Ruth B. Jeffris, Janesville; Samuel M. Pedrick, Ripon; Richardson Sanford; Scanlan, and Philip G. Stratton, Superior.
