If you like mysteries with a liberal dash of meriment; if you relish your murders piquantly flavored with a pinch of giggles and a garnishing of guffaws, we heartily recommend your attention to "Dangerous Blondes," which unraveled its gay tale for the first time yesterday at the Quilna theatre. If you find no joy in these things, we can only commiserate with you.

"Dangerous Blondes" features Allyn Joslyn as typewriter sleuth Barry Craig, and Evelyn Keyes as his willing, but not too able wife, Jane.

The pair become involved in a killing, even before it occurs, while Julie, a friend of Jane's, hysterically sobs out her suspicion that someone is going to be murdered at the McCormick Photography Studio, where she works. Jane returns to the studio with Julie and meets Mac (Edmund Lowe), the owner, and several of his assistants. They are busy setting the stage for a sitting, featuring socialite Mrs. Fleming. Just as Barry arrives on the scene, Mrs. Fleming is discovered murdered in her dressing room. "Appointment in Berlin" also is playing.

Charging the screen with high-voltage action and suspense, "Chetniks!" The Fighting Guerrillas now playing at the Lyric theatre.

Thrill follows thrill, as the daring Balkan patriots fight to destroy the conqueror's dream of conquest. An enemy troop train is destroyed, an ammunition dump blown sky-high, an enemy patrol ambushed. That's the handiwork of the death-defying men whose story is the story of bold people everywhere fighting the invader on their native soil.

While stirring action highlights the film, there is a full share of

romance and drama, too, as the guerrilla leader, played by Philip Dorn, and his men fight against staggering odds for the women, as well as the freedom, they love.

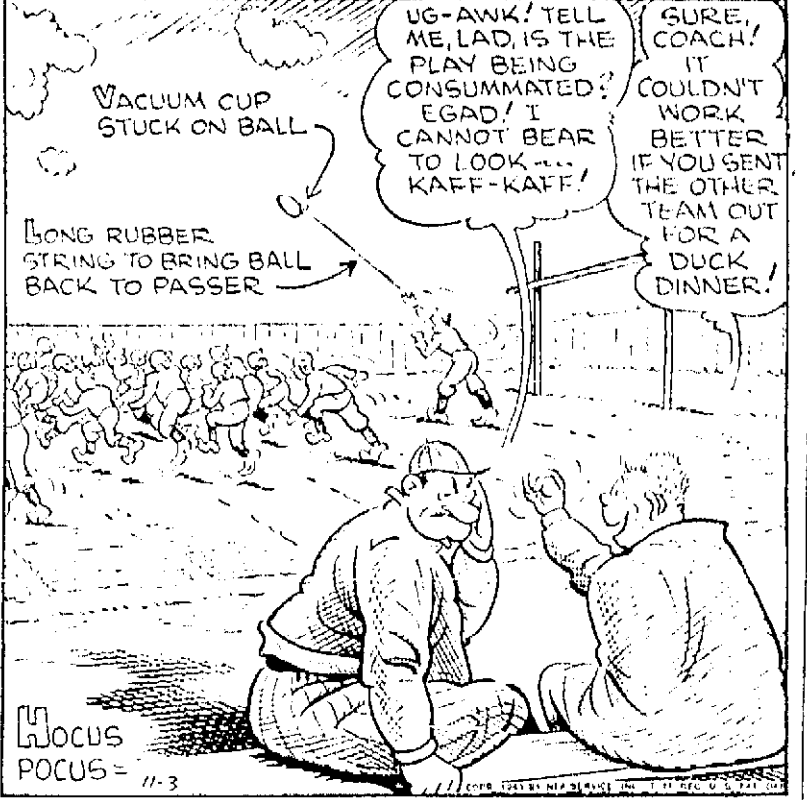
The film finds the occupying forces unable to cope with the Chetniks. As a last resort, they attempt to capture the leader thru his wife and children. When the townsfolk refuse to betray the whereabouts of the leader's family, they are threatened with starvation. A bold move by the guerrillas thwarts this threat momentarily, but a more brutal one follows.

Desperate, the invaders vow to wipe out the town, as they did Lidice, unless the Chetnik leader surrenders. His wife and children are already before a firing squad, when he leads a surprise raid that smashes the enemy garrison—an act that symbolizes the whole nation's determination to live in freedom.

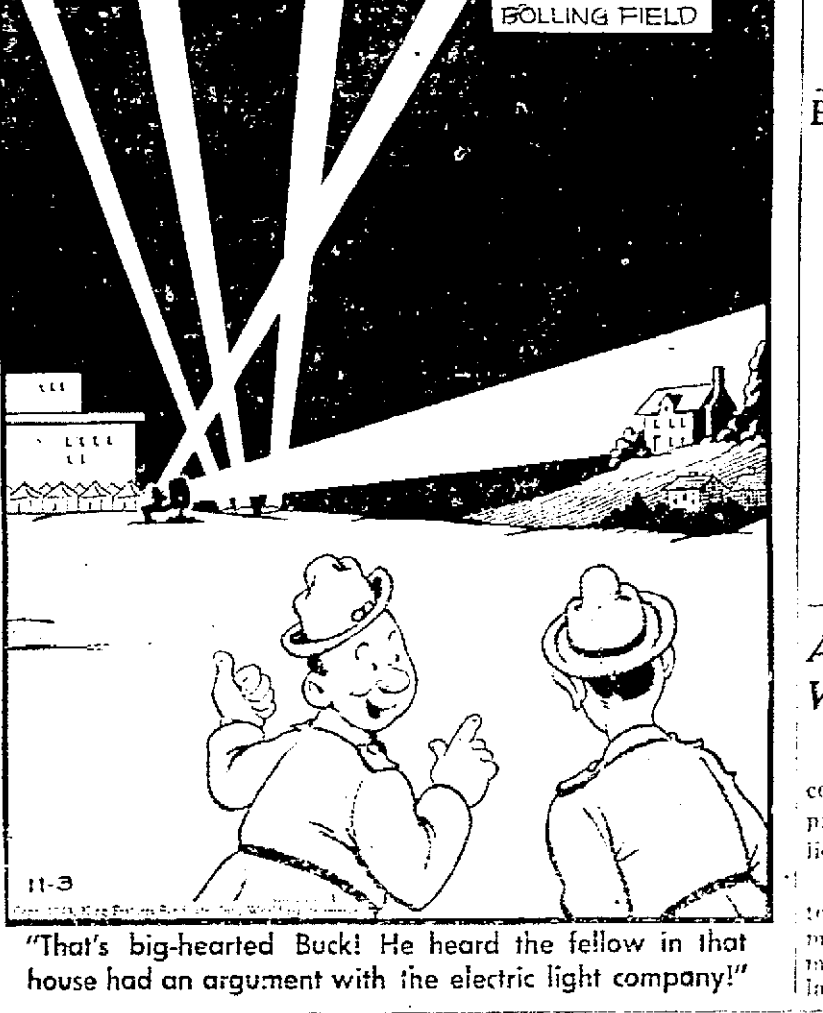


AREA OFFICERS WIN PROMOTIONS
