Schedules Are Juggled For The Holiday

Quilna Eliminates Preview; Ohio Moves Billing Up

Sports, musical comedy, and drama share the billings at Lima theatres this week. With Thursday being Thanksgiving, the Quilna has eliminated its preview and will start showing "Sweet Rosie O'Grady" on the holiday. The Ohio has also moved its billing ahead with "Northern Pursuit" scheduled to open Wednesday and in order to return to the old schedule "Johnny Come Lately" will open Nov. 28 and play for five days only.

"The Iron Major" is now playing at the Ohio with Pat O'Brien in the title role.

The Sigma offers "You're a Lucky Fellow, Mr. Smith" and "Hostages" for week-end entertainment.

With the return engagement of "In Old Chicago" the Quilna bills "Dancing Masters" starring the comedy hit team of Laurel and Hardy.

Deanna Durbin comes to the State Sunday in "Hers to Hold" a story of youths' reaction to the war. Also showing will be "Buckskin Frontier."

The dynamic Barbara Stanwyck expertly handles the title role in "Lady of Burlesque" which is showing today only as a co-feature with "Renfrew of the Royal Mounted" at the Lyric. "Dance Girl Dance" and "Primrose Path" open Monday.

Showing Sunday only at the Majestic theatre are "Shadow of a Doubt" and "Gildersleeve's Bad Day."

'Upholstered' Is Misnomer, Laurel Says

Sometimes the phrase "upholstered" is applied to the roly-poly heft of Stan Laurel's partner, Oliver Hardy. But Stan just can't see it.

Especially after what happened during the shooting of the laugh riot, "The Dancing Masters," currently showing at the Quilna theatre, and starring the famous comedy team.

In one scene, Stan was supposed to help Oliver to his feet after the latter had slipped on a carelessly thrown banana peel.

Little Stan helped the gigantic Hardy to his feet. But, deviating from the script, Oliver once again slipped on the same banana peel and fell directly atop his unprepared bantamweight partner, knocking the wind out of him.

Hardy's "upholstery" protected him, but for a while it was feared Laurel had suffered some broken ribs. However, an examination at the studio hospital revealed nothing more than a painful bruise, and after an hour's respite, Laurel was back on the set again.

The epic "In Old Chicago" is the co-feature of the program.

GERMANS CLAIM 3 MORE AEGEAN ISLANDS SEIZED

LONDON, Nov. 20—(AP)—The occupation of three more islands in the Aegean—Ikaria, Lipsos and Patmos—was claimed by the Germans today as a sequel to the loss by the British of Leros in the stepping stone battle of the Eastern Mediterranean.

The Berlin communique said Ikaria, small Greek island west of Samos and north of the Italian Dodecanese group, was garrisoned by Italians and that light German naval forces took 240 prisoners and seized a quantity of arms.

An undisclosed number of prisoners were seized in Lipsos and Patmos, north of Leros in the Dodecanese. The broadcast said these also were garrisoned by Italians.

Allied announcements never previously had announced occupation of these islands, although German broadcasts had mentioned German attacks on Ikaria.

COURT UPHOLDS TAXATION CLAIM

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 20—(AP)—The Ohio supreme court ruled yesterday the retail sales tax applied to sales of residents of another state where orders were accepted and delivery is made in Ohio.

The state board of tax appeals was upheld in assessing \$736.73 in sales tax against Trotwood Trailers, Inc., of Trotwood, Montgomery-co, for trailers sold to persons outside the state but delivered at the factory. The court ruled such sales were not in interstate commerce.

Filmed against the backgrounds of the schools and buildings where Cav's deeds were accomplished, the picture strikes an authentic note, and is unusual among the season's offerings.

Robert Fellows produced the film, with Ray Enright directing from the screenplay by Aben Kandel and Warren Duff, based on the original story by the Major's widow, Florence E. Cavanaugh.
