

Quilna Film Is Salute To Heroes Of U. S. Marines

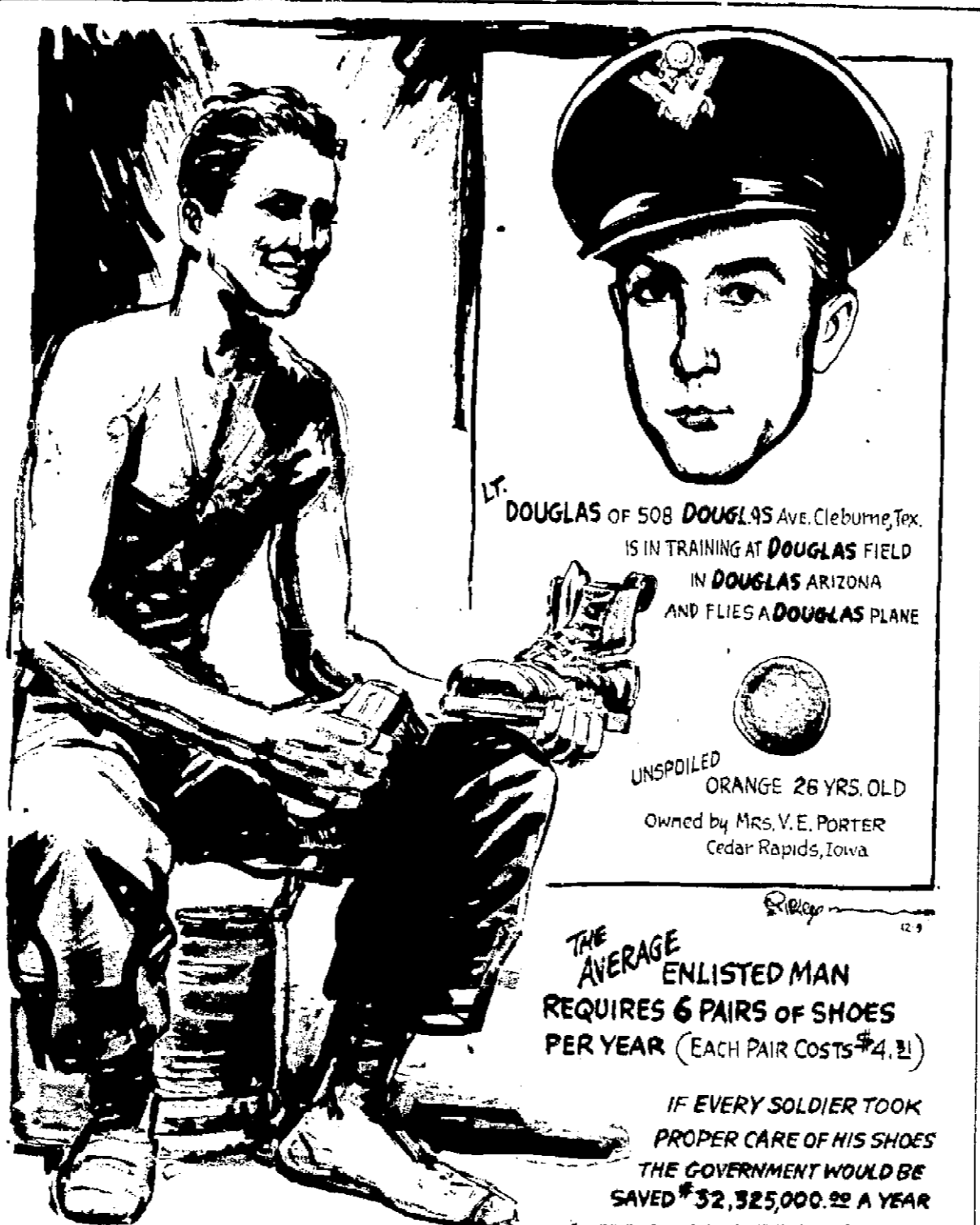
