Balkan Boundaries Have Been Changed Many Times

THE "Balkans" are in southeastern Europe and include Greece, Bulgaria, Albania, Yugoslavia and Rumania. A small part of Turkey also is classed as being in the Balkans.

The Balkan countries have an area of close to 320,000 square miles. That is a little more than the area of Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan combined.

In the Balkans live about 50,000,000 people, and what a center of storms they have been! Warfare for more than 2,500 years. Conquerors have marched in and sometimes—but not always—have marched out again.

A great mixing of races has taken place in the Balkans. The Greeks, Bulgars, and Turks do not all live inside Greece, Bulgaria and Turkey. Boundaries have changed time and again, and many

thousands of people have been left outside the homelands of their ancestors.

Yugoslavia was put together after the first world war. Most of its people are Serbs and Croats, but the country also contains Hungarians, Germans, Turks, Ruthenes, Italians, Albanians and Rumanians.

When the second world war started, Rumania was the largest Balkan country, both in area and population. It had two-fifths of the people in the Balkans and more than one-third of the land. Parts of Rumania have been "sliced off" since the war started, and the next peace treaty is likely to bring other changes.

Albania, the smallest Balkan nation, has only about 1,000,000 people. It was "created" only 30 years ago, but Albanian people have lived in the Balkans longer than any others, with the possible exception of the Greeks.

When the Turks had control of the Balkans, many of the people became Mohammedans. To this day there are great numbers of Mohammedans in Albania, and some of them wear costumes which remind us of the dress of old-time Turks.
