SENATE PROBES LIQUOR SYSTEM

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—(INS)—Senate liquor investigators bowed today to track down the black market in liquor and then do something to stop it.

New Deal For Domestic In England Seen

By ROSETTE HARGROVE LONDON, Dec. 18.—Before the war, when Mrs. Suburbia thought about domestic service in the U. S. A., it was usually in terms of Hollywood, where maids came to work in their own cars, received enormous wages for little work, and dressed as snarls as their mistresses. Little did she dream of those far-off days that "it might happen here." But after a period of over three years with few or no servants available, she realizes that while domestic service will return with the peace, it will never again be on the 1929 scale.

This is one of the many revolutions which have swept the British scheme of living. Minister of Labor Ernest Bevin now has declared in the House of Commons that he is contemplating a new deal for domestic servants.

An eight-hour working day and a day off each week are suggested as the foundation for the new domestic charter. Other conditions proposed are a minimum wage—\$3 for domestics living in and \$10 for those living out—with higher salaries according to experience and work done, as well as a minimum yearly vacation with full pay and living expenses.

The new charter, besides providing for minimum wages and better hours, also proposes to campaign for better accommodation and meals, likewise the raising of domestic servants from their "m-in-al" status.

This is where the revolution comes in. For the best part of her life Mary Ann has been answering Mrs. Suburbia's bell from 7 a. m. until any time up to 10:30 p. m. She accepted a regime which gave her one free night in

seven, provided she was in by 10:30—and hated it all the time. Most of the girls now in the wartime services who previously were domestics declare they never will return to being maids and cooks. And all over the country, women who have found in the course of the last three years that there were other ways of earning a livelihood are saying the same thing. Many of them have learned to use their hands in the making of fine precision instruments, in diving anything from a car to a 5-ton truck, in repairing airplanes. Few if any will be content to devote time to polishing another woman's furniture and floors.

If, however, domestic service mopping up another woman's eventually is raised to the rank of skilled labor, the outlook will be different. Housewives of all classes, to start with, will have to resign themselves to doing much more in their homes, as they are now doing.

There are plans afoot for girls who desire to specialize in domestic service after the war.

First is the establishment of a proper scheme of training. Students straight from school would enter on a 2-year course provided either by the local authorities at a special technical college or Ministry of Labor centers. There would be a six-months refresher course, with maintenance grants, for women now in the services or in industry, who would wish to return to domestic service. At the end of the course, girls would sit for an examination and obtain a certificate, implying registration as a trained domestic worker.
