Brodhead Woman's Letters Grow Into Service Newzette

BRODHEAD—Mrs. Belle Fleek Harlow says she had a "brainstorm" one night.

Her "brainstorm" has become the Harlow Newzette, now boosting the morale of 256 Brodhead servicemen and women stationed in all parts of the world.

For months Mrs. Harlow has been writing letters to more than 75 hometown men in the services. A short time ago she conceived the idea of sending out a Christmas news sheet. With her husband's "moral support," Mrs. Harlow gathered news, edited it, and collected contributions to have the Newzette printed and sent to all Brodhead men and women in the services. She is planning an Easter edition now.

Brings Friends Together

"One of the main purposes of the Newzette is to bring friends together who may not know that they are both stationed in the same area," Mrs. Harlow says.

Mr. and Mrs. Harlow's self-designated "service HQ" is explained in this excerpt from the Christmas edition:

"For you fellows, who do not know us, we are just a couple of lonesome folks who run a gift shop, in with Bert Bouton, and have adopted everyone of Uncle Sam's boys and girls, keeping your addresses up to date—along with a record of your service from induction on . . . We welcome your letters, and try to share their news with other boys."

About 250 servicemen and women are "written up" in the one-sheet, 4,000-word letter. Their marriages, engagements, APO numbers, injuries, and accomplishments are relayed to others in items like these:

"J. B. Searies, in San Diego, married his WAVE sweetheart in August; also was in a movie made by the marines and had to grow a beard for it . . . Roy Young went through the siege of Attu, and came through O. K., minus 45 pounds, and with three bullet holes through his knitted cap . . . Hope your Christmas boxes came through O. K., Harry, as we packed them for your folks."

Letters Reward Enough

Mrs. Harlow calls the Newzette a "hobby" which she enjoys when she's not keeping house or clerking at the gift shop. She says the appreciative letters pouring into her "service HQ" are reward enough. Many of them are from men stationed overseas who have already gotten the Christmas Newzette.

"I think I'll have to get a secretary to take care of the dozens of letters," she says.

The informal friendliness of the Newzette, which prompted such an enthusiastic response, is shown in these lines from the paper's final paragraph:

"If any of you want any addresses, drop me a line and I'll

Official Says BBC Has No Monitors Here

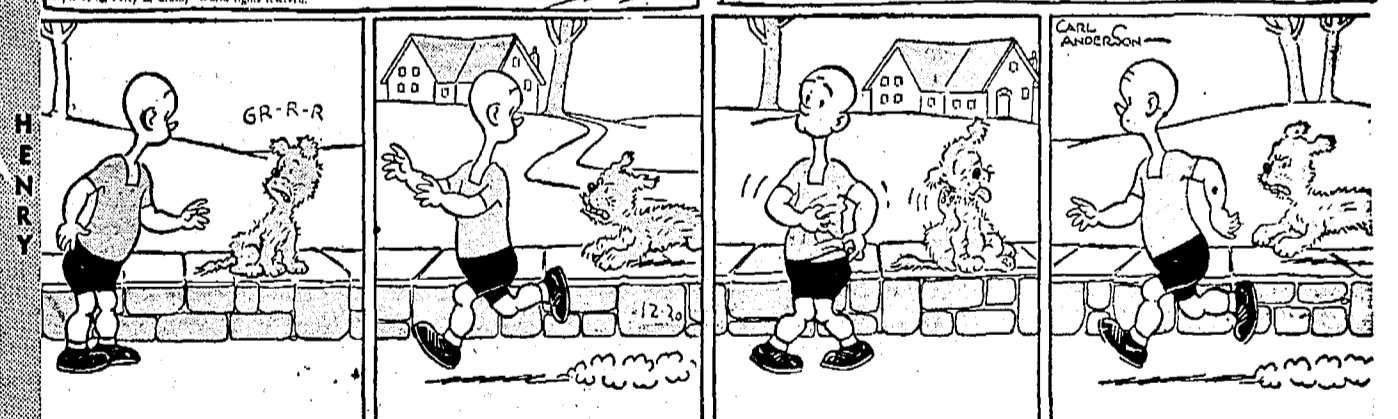
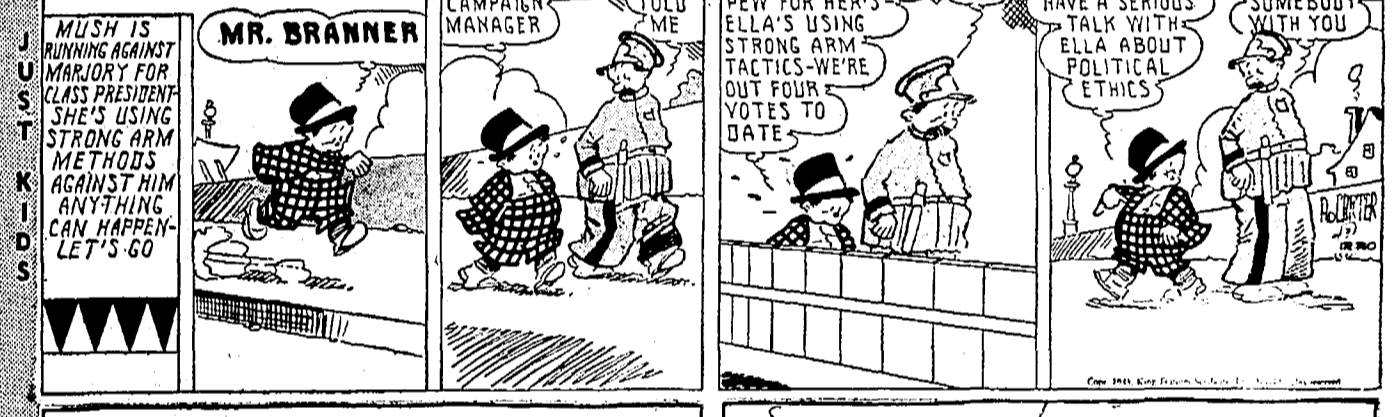
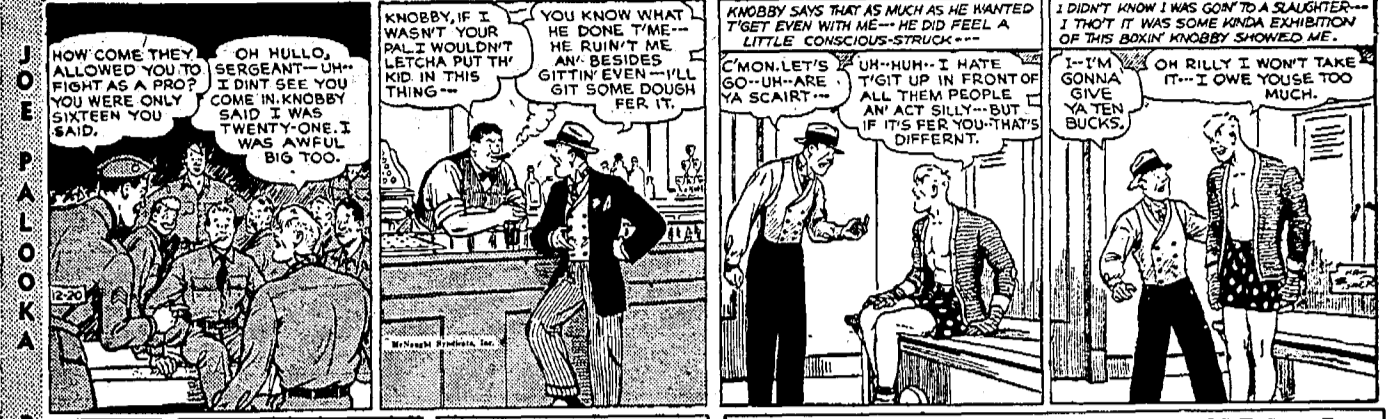
NEW YORK—(U.P.)—The British Broadcasting Co. has issued a statement saying that it "has no news monitors in this country."

Uncle Ray's Corner

FORMER RAILROAD MAN TELLS OF SEEING METEOR EXPLODE

I am now 71 years of age. There must be a great many people living today who saw that comet.

"I was a railroad man for a good many years and was outside at all hours of the night, and have seen some strange sights in the night sky.

"I remember one early morning in 1898 when a meteor traveled across the eastern sky and then seemed to explode. Fire shot out in all directions, and some of it seemed to hit the earth. I wonder whether meteors do hit the earth."

Most meteors burn away to dust before reaching the ground. They rub against the air and become hot, glowing in the sky for a second or two. Then they go out of sight, usually with nothing falling on the ground except dust or ashes, which are so fine that no one sees them come down.

Some large meteors, however, fall to the earth in the form of cin-

ders. The cinners differ in size, some being smaller than a man's hand.

I have seen dozens of meteor cinners, the largest being the one which Admiral Peary brought back from Greenland. It is on display at the American Museum of Natural History in New York City.

From time to time a meteor explodes in the air, like the one Mr. Davis describes. The comet of which he speaks must have been the fine comet which appeared in 1882.
