WASHINGTON, Jan. 4—(AP)—President Roosevelt named a three-man committee today to investigate a dispute involving the fair employment practices committee, railway labor organizations and the 16 southern carriers over the question of racial discrimination.

The members are: Judge Walter P. Stacy, Raleigh, N. C., chairman; Judge William H. Holly of the U. S. district court, Chicago; and Mayor Frank J. Lausche of Cleveland.

The railroads involved had declined to abide by an order of the FEPC for greater employment of Negroes and the agency referred the dispute to the President.

Public Hearing On Prohibition Bill Scheduled

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4—(AP)—Following demands of more than 100,000 individual petitioners for immediate legislative action, a house judiciary subcommittee will begin public hearings next week on national prohibition legislation.

Chairman Hobbs (D-Ala.) said the hearing probably would start Wednesday, with prohibition advocates as the first witnesses.

The hearings will be on legislation introduced last March by Rep. Bryson (D-C. C.), to outlaw beverages containing more than one half on one per cent alcohol by volume, the prohibition to remain in effect until "the termination of demobilization" at the end of the war.

Its professed purpose is "to reduce absenteeism, conserve manpower and speed production of materials necessary for the winning of the war."

A bitter fight is expected to develop over the proposal, which has strong house backing. Opponents contend it would be unfair to members of the armed forces to impose prohibition by statute at a time when they can not express their views in a referendum.

Republicans take Columbus control

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 4—(INS)—Republicans took over both the legislative and executive branches of Columbus' city government Monday for the first time in 14 years.

James A. Rhodes, 34-year-old retiring city auditor, will be sworn in as mayor, and the new council of five Republicans and two Democrats will hold its organization meeting.

Rhodes, believed to be the youngest mayor the city has ever had, will be sworn in after the council meeting, after he has handed in his resignation as auditor. His term still had two years to run.

NEW EDITOR NAMED COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 4—(UP)—Ralph Burkholder, editor of the Indianapolis Times, today became editor of The Columbus Citizen, succeeding Walter Morrow, who has resigned.

Don't Forget Withholding Tax On '43 Income Returns

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4—(UP)—With the March 15 income tax day nearer than you think, here are some pertinent facts about the working of the withholding plan.

You will start paying 1944 taxes in the deduction from the first pay check covering a payroll period that falls wholly in 1944. In other words, if your next check covers a few days in December as well as January, the amount withheld from it will apply only to your 1943 taxes.

An individual's tax liability could be somewhat involved until March 15. During the first two and a half months of this year, many will be paying 1944 taxes thru paycheck deductions and at the same time be owing the government on 1943 taxes.

This will come about because an estimated 35,000,000 persons will owe varying amounts on their 1943 obligations as well as the "unforfeitable" portions of the 1942 tax that is to be paid March 15.

The taxpayer, however, may apply for an extension that would allow him to pay only half of the 1942 debt this year, and the other half on March 15, 1946.

Thousands of workers who never before filed tax papers, including many boys and girls, will do so this year. While many did not earn enough during the entire year to pay taxes, their compensation for summertime or after school jobs was subject to withholding tax and they will file forms to get back the payments. If they do not, their parents can include the wages on their returns and claim credit for the deductions.

Like the youthful workers, many who worked only a few weeks or months and were forced into idleness for the remainder of the year
