

Rooney, Garland Team In Ohio Film, "Girl Crazy"

With Mickey Rooney and Judy Garland teamed for the eighth time, "Girl Crazy" opens at the Ohio theatre Friday. Judy sings several songs by the late George Gershwin including "Bidin' My Time" and "Embraceable You." The film has that fast-moving sensation which is typical of the Rooney-Garland series.

"It Happened One Night" and "Is Everybody Happy" will be co-featured at the Quilna theatre starting with the preview Friday night. Closing with the large Friday billing is "Sahara."

Now showing at the Sigma are "Spider Woman" and "False Colors." "Fallen Sparrow" and "Adventure in Iraq" are now screened at the State theatre.

The Lyric film house now offers "Riders of the Border" and "Suspected Person."

"Sky's the Limit" and "A Night to Remember" are appearing on the double feature program at the Majestic.

That's what is presented in "Girl Crazy," co-starring Mickey Rooney and Judy Garland. It marks the eighth joint appearance for Mickey and Judy, in a picture destined to top even their outstanding efforts of "Babes in Arms," "Strike Up the Band" and "Babes on Broadway." The film opens at the Ohio theatre Friday.

Accompanied by Tommy Dorsey and his orchestra, Judy sings many of the most beloved songs of the late George Gershwin, including "I've Got Rhythm," "Embraceable You," "Bidin' My Time" and "But Not For Me." A chorus of 100 dancing boys and girls join the stars in the elaborate musical numbers.

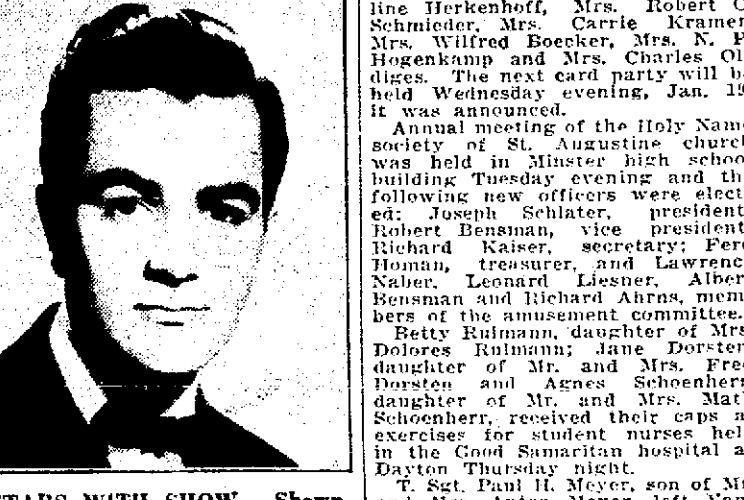

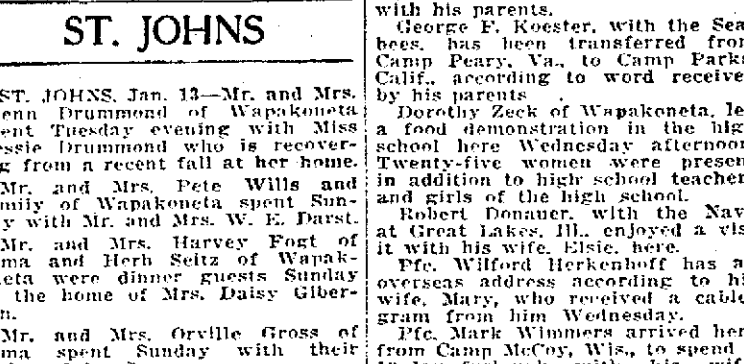
