Yanks 'Fed Up' With Politics

WASHINGTON — (UP) — The Army and Navy Journal warned congress today that the men in the armed forces are "fed up" on politics and wage racketeering, and favor national service legislation.

The service publication said that men in uniform would watch the way senators and representatives vote on the issue "and in the coming elections they will not forget the stand their respective representatives took."

The Journal said the legislation, if enacted, would heighten morale and convince "the Allied and enemies alike" that the American home front was making an all-out effort so that "the war would be shortened and countless American lives saved."

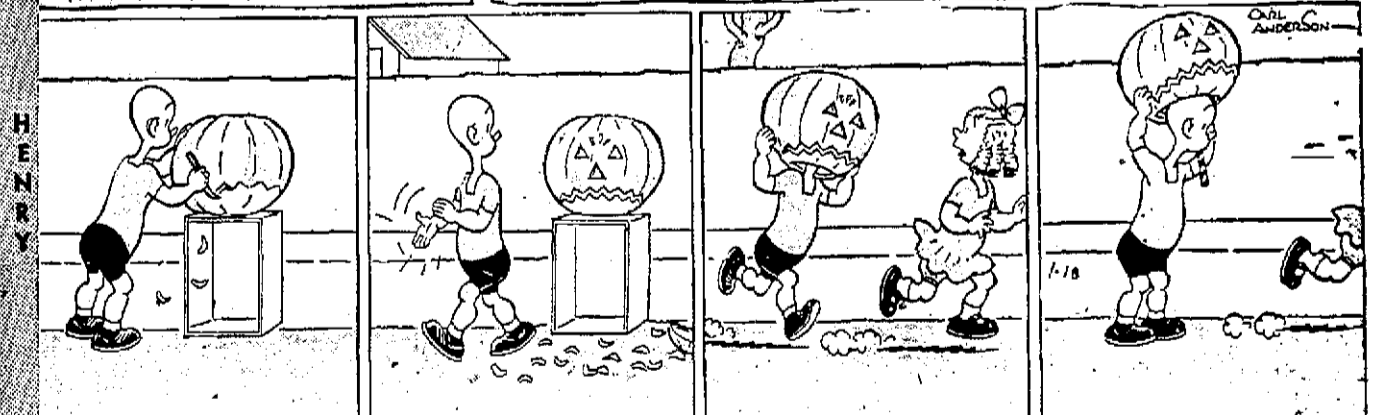
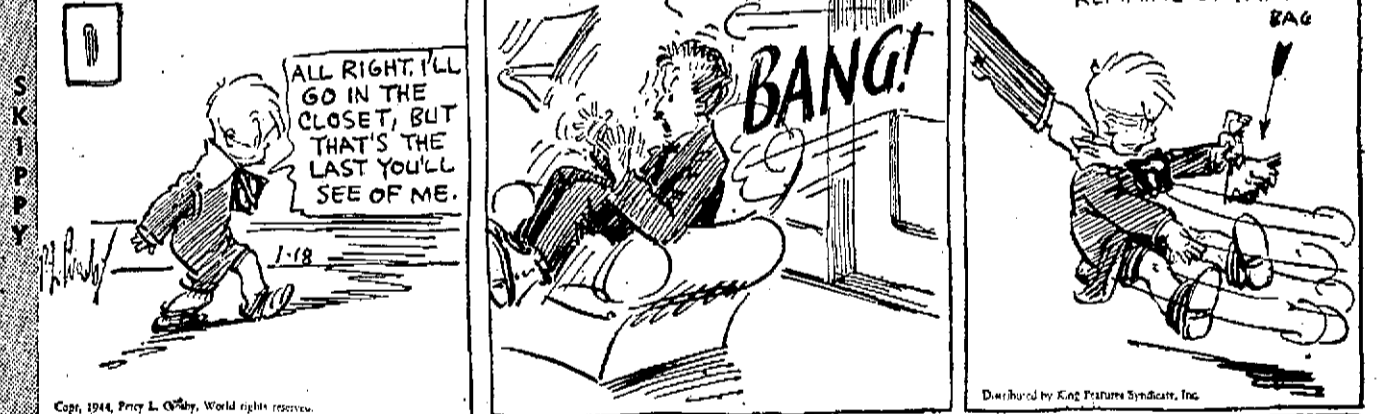
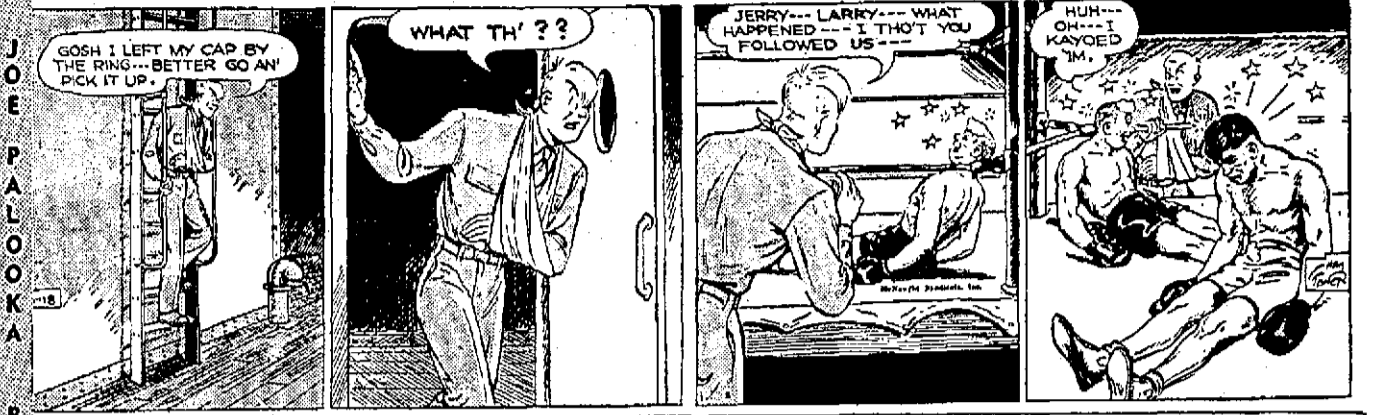
Secy. of Labor Frances Perkins said Saturday that her department is collecting "all necessary information" on the subject of national service.

She told reporters at a press conference that she didn't know whether national service would be a good thing, adding that she could not comment on a "general idea."

Meanwhile, Sen. Warren R. Austin (R., Vt.), co-author of a national service bill, said he pinned is hopes for enactment of the program sought by Pres. Roosevelt on popular support.

Venice Credited With Looking Glass Invention IN THE myths of more than one ancient race, we find words about mirrors. In a Greek story, the hero Perseus had a brightly polished shield which served as a mirror. By using it in that way, he was able to see Medusa, the dangerous Gorgon, with out looking at her directly.

'ing looking glasses was worked out after the year 1830. A sheet of glass was "silvered" with a liquid which contained a silver salt, tartaric acid and sugar candy. At this time most looking glasses are silvered. The silvery coat is placed on what we call the back of the mirror.
