Income Tax Information

EARNED INCOME—DEDUCTIBLE EXPENSE

In figuring the amount of your salary, wages, and other compensation for personal services you may deduct any ordinary and necessary expenses incurred in earning this income.

If your employer or anyone else reimburses you for your expense or gives you a travel allowance or expense account, these amounts must be included in your wages or other compensation.

A distinction must be made, however, between expense attributable to your employment—which can be deducted—and personal expense, which may not be deducted. A few examples will illustrate:

Expenses of travel in connection with your employment, or business, are deductible. Such expense ordinarily includes transportation, meals, and lodging, but it does not include the cost of laundry, clothes pressing, and other expenses of a nature which would be incurred if you stayed home.

Travel expense deductions, to be allowable, must be supported when required by the Commissioner by a statement showing (1) the nature of business, (2) number of days away from home, (3) amount of expenses, incident to meals and lodging, (4) amount of other expenses claimed as a deduction.

Expenses of a salesman in entertaining customers for the purpose of getting business, including taxicabs, theatre tickets and dinners, telephone and telegraph messages, and the like, are deductible. However, this type of expense may not be deducted by an officer or employee of a corporation whose contract of employment does not specifically require him to make such expenditures.

Expense of getting to and from work, such as commutators' fares and bus and street car fares, are considered as personal expenses, and are not deductible.

A person on a roving commission and maintaining no permanent home is not entitled to expenses for meals and lodging while traveling.

In the case of shared travel, as in a car or hotel room, the expenses must be prorated and only the share of the taxpayer is deductible.

The amounts spent in seeking a job, as well as the cost of traveling to the place where a new job is to be taken up, are personal expenses and are not deductible. Fees paid to an employment agency, however, are deductible.

Membership fees in a labor union, or in an organization which renders a protective service to its members, are allowable deductions.

Cost of uniforms and equipment is deductible expense to the extent (1) that such are specifically required, and (2) that they do not take the place of ordinary clothing in civil life. Uniforms of nurses, railway trainmen, barbers, and surgeons are held to take the place of ordinary clothing, and their cost, accordingly, is not deductible. Cost of military and naval uniforms and related equipment, such as gold lace and gilt buttons, is not deductible, but the cost of certain items, such as corps devices, campaign bars, and the like, which are especially required by the profession, is deductible.

The uniforms of baseball players and other professional athletes are not considered clothing adapted to general wear, and their cost is deductible. The same also applies to the cost of helmets, rubber coats, and rubber boots required to be purchased and worn by city firemen, and the cost of rubber coats and rubber boots required to be purchased and worn by city policemen.

PLANE FACTORY PAY INCREASES ARE APPROVED

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 25—(INS)—Thousands of workers at the Columbus Curtiss-Wright warplane plant will benefit from yesterday's approval by National Stabilization Director Fred M. Vinson of new maximum pay rates, it was revealed today.

The new rates, which become effective with Vinson's approval, were ordered last Dec. 11 by the National War Labor Board. The new schedule does not raise wages generally but provides wage ceiling raises of 5 to 15 cents per hour in 10 job classifications and boosts the hiring rate to 65 cents an hour in all grades.

Also under the schedule a lump sum in retroactive payment of \$2 for each full week employment spent on the company's pay roll since Nov. 23, 1942, will be paid.

Only mint and tenth grade laborers do not receive any maximum pay increase under the new schedule. Grades six, seven and eight will receive a maximum ceiling of 5-cents more; three, four and five, 10-cents more and grades one and two, 15 cents.

Under the new scale, \$1.50 per hour is the new top for the highest skilled workers. The old rate was \$1.35.

POSTAL EXAMS ARE CALLED FOR EXTRA WORKERS

Competitive examinations for substitute clerk-carriers in a number of first class postoffices in Ohio including Lima have been announced for the near future by the Sixth U. S. Civil Service Region director whose office are in Cincinnati.

Appointments of successful candidates will be made on a war duration basis and in no case will extend more than six months beyond the end of the war. The basic salary rate is 65 cents an hour for substitutes.

Applicants will be advised of the examination and must appear for examination in the city where employment is desired. In this district the examinations will be given in Lima, Bellefontaine, Celina, Findlay, Kenton, Sidney and Van Wert.

TRAFFIC DEATH TOLLS CHECKED

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 25—(AP)—Nearly 12 of every 100,000 Ohioans were killed in traffic accidents last year, a survey by the State Highway Department indicated today.

The report was compiled from statistics in Harry E. Neal's traffic and safety division and issued in connection with the 1943 all-Ohio traffic safety contest.

The highway department said only Ashland of the state's eligible communities failed to enroll in this year's safety contest, which represents about 75 per cent of the state's 7,500,000 residents.

March 15 is the contest deadline for reporting deaths and accidents. Winning towns will be awarded plaques in April.
