It can be recognized in the roots by peeling back the bark of the roots. The woody, central part of the root will be white in healthy roots, various shades of brown in roots affected by wilt.

Bacterial wilt has been known in Ohio for more than 15 years and has become increasingly sericus in that time, according to C. The disease is slow to develop, so that at least one year of good cuttings is always obtained before the stand is destroyed, usually two years, and sometimes more.
