OTTAWA, Feb. 1.—Weather during 1943 ran the gamut of conditions here it was learned today from the annual report of John T. Maudlow, government observer.

Up to August the community had a head start for a new record rainfall. However, the precipitation that visited the area during the last five months of last year fell so far below normal that the total rainfall for the year was 62 of an inch below the high mark since Maudlow began keeping records 49 years ago.

The total rainfall in 1943 was 42.25 inches. The record was set in 1929 with 42.87 inches while in 1912 there was a rainfall of 42.82 inches.

Three records were established, however, by weather in 1943. The heaviest rainfall for a single month came in May with 12.06 inches.

On June 28, the heaviest rainfall for a single day was chalked up at 4.02 inches. December had only .6 of an inch of rainfall to set a new low for that month in 49 years.

SENATE STUDIES BILL ON SALE OF SURPLUS GOODS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—(INS)—A bill to keep war plants and billions of dollars in surplus Army and Navy goods out of the hands of speculators thru direct sale by the government to the people was being prepared today for delivery to the senate.

The bill, which would centralize sales of all surpluses under a single government agency, was passed by the house some time ago. The senate committee on executive expenditures has been inserting more teeth into it.

According to Sen. Aiken (R-Vt.), the war plants, goods, material and equipment are estimated in some quarters to have cost as much as 50 billion dollars.

Both the Maritime Commission, which is building the wartime merchant fleet, and the War and Navy departments are said to be opposing a central agency to dispose of surpluses.

PASTOR URGES GOOD AND BAD NEWS BE GIVEN

COLUMBUS, Feb. 1.—(UP)—Dr. Peter Marshall, Washington Presbyterian minister, last night called for bad news as well as good news to be given to the people so that they might share equally with those at the fighting fronts.

Speaking before a record 2,300 representatives of the 28th annual Ohio pastors' convention, Dr. Marshall said "someone seems to be afraid of shocking the country."

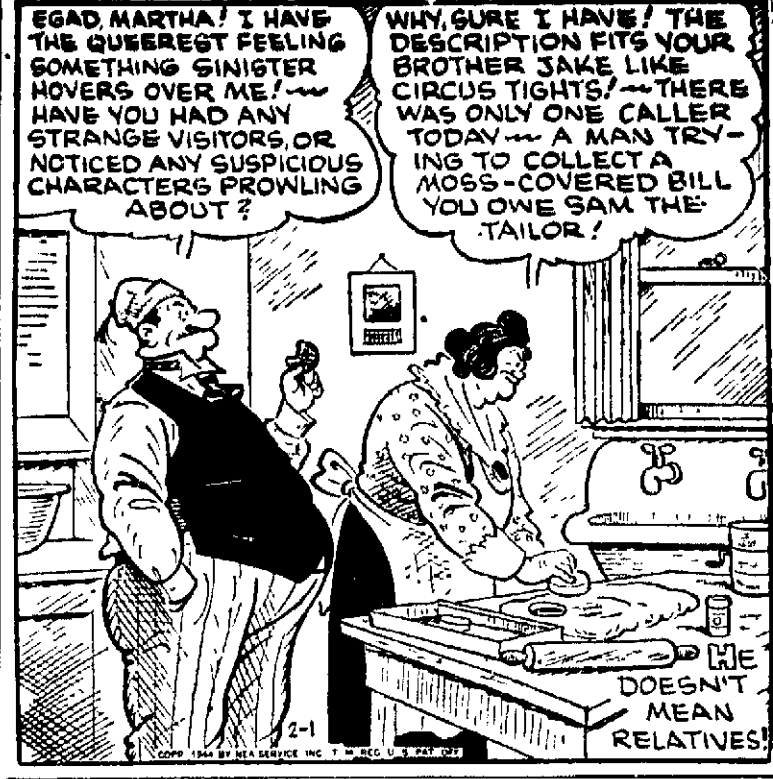
"There seems to be a double standard in operation," he continued, "one for our fighting men on the various fronts all over the world, and another for our people at home."

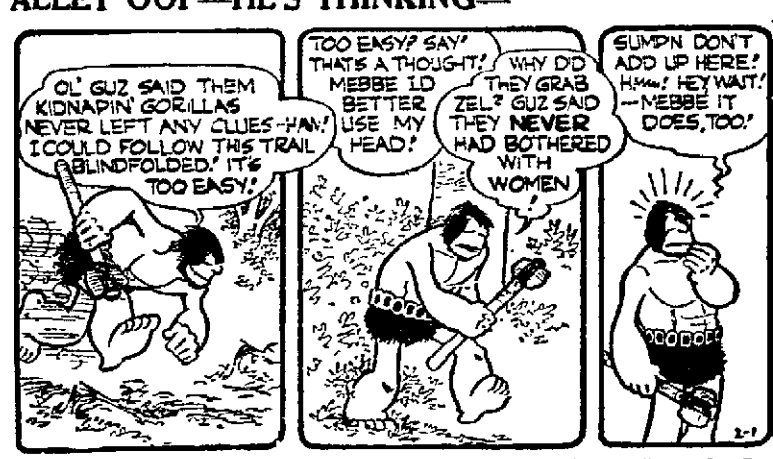

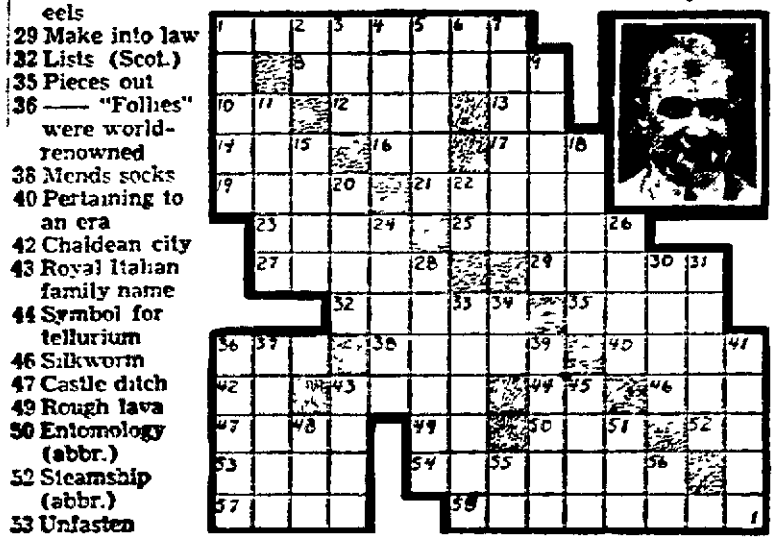
TOM AND ELYSE PLAN REUNION
