comet is about 80,000 miles wide. In June, 1910, the head of Halley's Comet was 320,000 miles wide. That was a big head, but it did not equal some other comets. The Great Comet of 1811, for example, had a head which was larger than the sun!

Where there is a large head, there also is a long tail. Sometimes the tail of a comet is well over 100,000,000 miles long.

Comet heads and tails are made of material which, in general, is of very light weight. There are some solid objects in the head, but the greater part is made of gas and dust. It is believed that a very large comet has less than a millionth part as much weight as the earth.

"Having reached my seventysixth year," writes Mr. Robert J. Bailey, "I was one of the fortunate persons who saw the Great Comet of 1882, a sight never to be forgotten. Its wide, glowing tail was rose-tinted. Will this comet ever

be seen again?" The 1882 comet is expected to return, but not for many hundreds the Great Comet of 1882 was the largest ever seen.

The 1882 comet ranks as one of the largest ever seen. It had a far larger core, or neucleus, than far larger core, or neucleus, than seems to me almost time for a good surprise in the sky. It has been almost 34 years since Halley's Comet last appeared. That one will not come again until 1985 or 1986, but some other beautiful comet ought to show itself during the next few years. Perhaps people in this generation will something to equal the Great Comet of 1882.
