# Quartet to Play at 8 Tonight

### Mozart, Beethoven Music on Program

The Pro Arte quartet will give a free concert of cham-ber music at 8 tonight in Music hall auditorium, playing Mozart's C-major and Beethoven's F-major (Opus 59) quartets. The Mozart work startled

the musical world at its first performance with the obvious discords and dashes of the first movement. In Mozart's day, many musicians "corrected" the music, thinking the composer had made mistakes in the score: The music was designed, however, to introduce a new style of writing which emphasized the discord and strife of the first section to allow a feeling of screnity to emerge in the later passages. The Beethoven quartet is considered a test of musicianship for its performers, because of its difficulty and the unusual delicacy required in the slow movement.

### 5,000 Foundry Men Plan Strike in Chicago Area

CHICAGO -(U.R)- More than 5,000 foundry workers, members of Local 233 of the Molder and Foundry Workers of America (AFL), today prepared to strike Monday to enforce their demands for a 6-cent-an-hour wage increase.

A special panel of the regional War Labor Board denied the raise Friday and the union voted to strike at a closed meeting Friday night. The panel said the increase, approved by the employers in the 51 plants in the Chicago area where the foundrymen are employed, was not warranted be-cause of a previous pay increase granted in May, 1942.
