Books Discuss Religion, Ethics

A new booklet of titles dealing with problems of religion and ethics has been prepared by the Madison Free library for distribution during the Lenten season.

All of the 23 titles listed have been purchased during the last year and cover a wide range of subjects, Miss Farr said. Of general interest is "The Sacred Writings of the World's Great Religions," selected and edited by Dr. S. E. Frost.

Problems of another religious group are discussed under the title, "Leading a Jewish Life in a Modern World," by Samuel H. Markowitz.

Particularly suitable to the season are "Jesus in the Light of History," a scholarly study by A. T. Olmstead, professor of oriental history at the University of Chicago.

Many other books on religion in addition to those included in the book list, will be displayed at the city library during Lent.
