






# John J. Niles, Folk Singer, to Be at Union Next Sunday

John Jacob Niles, singer of American folk songs will be heard at the Wisconsin Union theater, at 4:15 p. m. next Sun-day at the Sunday Music hour. This will be his third appearance here in two years. The program will be sponsored by the Union's student music committee.

Niles is nationally recognized as an "erudite musician" whose programs are made up exclusively of the songs he has recorded and arranged. He ac-companies himself on a homemade dulcimer.

A Kentuckian, he has lived. worked and researched most of his life in communities where traditional American balladry is sung. He searches out music sung by early settlers of Tennessee and Kentucky who brought their native music with them when they came from the British Isles in the 17th and 18th centuries.

The madrigals, ballads, sailor chanties, and street songs have undergone a few changes through generations of singing, but the fundamental spirit of the early English music remains.

Admission to the concert will be free to Union members and the public is invited for a small fee.
