Poor Johnny, He'd Be Rich-

NEW YORK- (U.P.) -There would be great days for Johnny Black, who has been dead more than seven years now and was out of the public mind long before that.

Johnny was a fast man with a dollar and he would have plenty of them to speed into circulation. Johnny wrote "Paper Doll."

As a composer - musician, Black was hep to the longhair stuff but his own work was in the pop field and "Dardanella" was his first big hit. He touched both the high and low spots back in the early twenties and the low spots came almost exclusively after that. He was broke more often than the camel's back. But he never made a dollar that

he didn't enjoy. These days the old hands in the entertainment world recall the lavish parties that Johnny used to throw when he was in the chips. Anyone was welcome and he was his own entertainer, playing the piano or fiddle. His moods were un-

predictable. During the "Dardanella" windfall he decided one night to sail the next morning for Paris. He phoned a half a dozen of his girl friends to be on hand and, when they showed up at his apartment, he loaded each of them down with

his clothing, manuscripts, musical instruments, etc., herded them into a taxi, and drove to the pier, where the uncorraled duffle was dumped out and the girls dismissed. He had no reservation, but the story goes that he turned on the personality and shared the captain's quarters for the voyage. As for "Paper Doll," it was

written a quarter of a century ago and kicked around for three years before it was published. Johnny liked it but it didn't catch on at first and then it somehow got shoved into the background by newer pieces and everyone forgot about it. In June, 1942, the Mills brothers dug it out of someone's memory and made a recording. The rest is musical and financial history.

Black rats killed most of the native rats in western Europe. Later they were taken-by accident-to North and South America, Often they got aboard by climbing ropes or cables which stretched from decks to piers while vessels were at anchor. Nowadays it is a custom to place

metal or wooden shields on cables which reach to piers or docks. If the shields are made properly, the rats cannot pass them. Black rats do not like water, and would not care to swim to a steamer. The second great rat invasion of

Europe took place only about 240 years ago. In this case the larger and stronger "brown rats" came out of the Orient, and spread over the European mainland, also over Great Britain. To some extent

they killed off the black rats. section of your scrapbook.) Brown rats are not afraid of water and are excellent swimmers.
