# **Leading Books** on War Listed

#### Free Library Staff Selects 32 Titles

Staff members participating in the Madison Free library's "Book News" program this year have prepared a list of outstanding books on war and peace for the Wisconsin Library Bulletin, a state publication. Helen E. Farr, city librarian, announced last

Begun in 1942 and repeated this year by popular request, this active program of book reviews provides speakers for city organizations desiring upto-date information on available war books.

Twenty-seven titles are in-cluded under the heading "Outstanding Books on the War, 1943," together with five others, classed as supplementary because they deal less directly with the war and peace. The list, which was made at the suggestion of Mary K. Reely of the state library commission, also is available to the public in the form of separates, which may be obtained at the library information desk.

In the evaluation of last year's contribution to war literature, recency played little part in the final choices, Miss Farr said. Any book concerned with the war bearing the 1943 copyright was eligi-ble for consideration when the eight librarians participating in the "Book News" program met to make their decisions.

. Members of the more than 30 organizations for which the Madison Free library has provided speakers since October will find some books reviewed by these librarians missing from this list, however. While the policy in choosing titles for book talks has been naturally somewhat selective, the term "outstanding" has been applied only to those upon which there is general agreement among the speakers as to their comparative value, Miss Farr explained.




