# Science Award Winners Named

WASHINGTON, March 8—(UP)—A 17-year-old boy who designed an "invisible" searchlight using infra-red rays, and a 16-year-old girl who constructed models of atoms, were proud possessors today of \$2,400 Westinghouse science scholarships granted annually to the most promising teen-age scientists found in a nation-wide search.

Top honors in this year's talent search, in which 15,000 high school students competed, went to Charles Ambriver Davidson, 17, of Fort Bridger, Wyo., and Anne Hagopian, 16, of New York City.

The scholarships will entitle the young scientists to attend any college or university in the country for four years subject to the approval of the scholarship committee of the Science Clubs of America, conductors of the annual talent search.

Alternates chosen for the grand scholarships were Robert H. Kraichnan, Elkins Park, Pa., and Mary Ruth Bond, Milton, N. Y., both of whom received four-year \$400 awards.

Others receiving \$400 awards included Kenneth William Ford, 17, Cleveland Heights, O.

There were also 25 \$100 scholarships granted to runners-up in the search for future scientists.

Awards were granted after a five-day examination conducted by the Science Clubs of America and presented at the Statler hotel last night by Dr. Harlow Shapley, director of the Harvard college observatory.

# FARM PRODUCTS PRICES HOLD TO STEADY LEVEL

COLUMBUS, March 8—(UP)—Prices received by Ohio farmers for their principal products remained virtually unchanged in mid-February except for eggs and potatoes which were slightly lower, the Ohio Cooperative Crop Reporting Service said today.

Meat animals were higher with the increases ranging from 20 cents for veal calves to 50 cents for market cattle.

The prices of wheat, corn soybeans, butterfat and whole milk were unchanged from Jan. 15. Apple and hay prices, however, continued an upward trend which had been in evidence since harvest.

Compared with Feb. 15, 1943, the prices of most crops were substantially higher altho meat animals, work stock and eggs were somewhat lower.

# JURY DISAGREES IN PENITENTIARY TRIAL

COLUMBUS, O., March 8—(AP)—After deliberating for three hours, a jury hearing the second degree murder trial of Wendell Stewart of Canton, inmate of Ohio penitentiary, disagreed and was dismissed by Criminal Court Judge Dana F. Reynolds.

The 36-year-old Stewart was charged with fatally stabbing another prisoner, Clarence Cartwright, 31, Sabina, at the penitentiary last June.

Assistant Prosecutor Forrest F. Smith said Stewart would be retried.

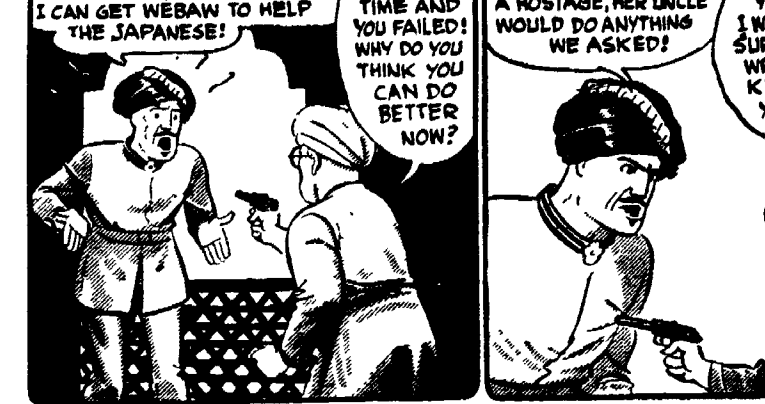
