Uncle Ray's Corner Fitch Tried in Vain to Get Money to Finance Invention The nation called the United States of America was only nine years of age when a 42-year-old inventor came forward with plans for a steamboat. The man was Robert Fitch. Born in Connecticut, Fitch worked as a gunsmith and clock-maker during his young manhood. He also was a surveyor and at one time was captured by Indians. His work as a surveyor took him to rivers in Ohio. That is one reason why his mind turned to the steamboat. Flatboats could drift down a river, but it was a great trouble to move them against a current. "Steam ought to do that work!" thought Fitch, and he set to work to draw up plans and make a small model of a steamboat. He went to New York City in 1785. The American Congress, at that time, held its meetings in New York, and he wanted money to be voted so he could carry on his work of making steamboats. The steamboat is a long one, and it is hard to say who should have most honor for making it a real thing. At least 20 men were important pioneers in making the invention. Among pioneers on this side of the Atlantic, it seems plain that Robert Fitch was first of all. He knew nothing about steamboat tests in Europe, and believed himself to be the first man who ever had thought of such a thing. Sad to say, the American Congress failed to give help to Fitch. Neither could he get money for his work from any of the state legislatures. Poor man as he was, he was able to raise small amounts to build steamboats. At length he formed a company with a capital of a little more than \$300. One of Fitch's plans was to have a steam-engine move upright oars. A boat of this kind was tried at Philadelphia on the Delaware river in 1786. There were 12 oars, six on each side, and they made the little vessel move. (For HISTORY section of your scrapbook.)
