Long Lash Makes Eskimo Dog Follow Orders

In the FAR NORTH MAIL CARRYING used to be HUSKY'S hard job. Nowadays MOTOR SLEDS do some of the TRANSPORT WORK.

Of all dogs in the world, the Eskimo dog is closest to the wolf. Indeed we may say that it is "largely wolf."

Often called a "husky" by white men, the Eskimo dog is strong and powerful. Eskimos in northern Canada and Alaska would find travel harder if it were not for animals of this kind.

Eskimos start training dogs when they are mere puppies. A little harness is put on, and the puppy strains hard to get back to its mother. By the time it is two or three months old, it is placed in harness with one or more full-grown dogs, and in that way gets used to drawing a sledge.

An old, well-trained Eskimo dog is chosen as the leader for each team which draws a sledge. Where this dog goes, the rest are supposed to follow.

No bridles or reins are used to guide the huskies. The driver simply shouts to them, and uses his long whip. The whip has a short handle, only about a foot long, but the lash is very long, sometimes measuring from 18 to 24 feet.

The dogs, being savage by nature, bite at one another while they run along, but usually they follow the leader. This dog seems to understand the orders to turn right or left, or to halt. If he does not carry out an order at once, the driver knows how to make him do so with his whip.
