Besides, as an offset to the release of manpower after the war thru demobilization of the armed services and thru cancellation of war orders in factories, other activities, which have been sidetracked or neglected for the duration, will be resumed. These include the great service and repair occupations, which have been undermanned for the duration. Likewise, with the ending of the abnormal status of seilers' markets, there will be an expanding need for manpower in the great sales and merchandising activities. Something akin to a pre-war ratio of those engaged in physical production - making things - and those engaged in service occupations will be restored, with a large swing back into the service activities which have been skimped during the war.

Then of course after reconversion, the peace industries, such as automobiles, radio, and household electrical appliances, which have been shut down for the duration, will be reopened, and will absorb manpower directly and indirectly. Meantime, there will be considerable transitional employment in the work of reconverting factories as we eventually beat our guns into plowshares.

In other words, the orderly transition from a war economy to a peace economy is feasible. provided we have the wit and the foresight to adopt sound governmental policies. The Baruch plan, like the senate George committee program, represents an attempt to deal forehandedly with such knotty problems. It is important during the transitional period to restore harmony between the legislative and executive departments, so that congress is willing to trust the chief executive with such discretion as may be necessary.

A curious paradox is the manner in which so-called unmercenary persons eventually become swamped by money matters. On the other hand, the orderly and prudent person, who thru a budget keeps his expenditures within his receipts, prevents money affairs from looming unduly large.

The idealist, who thinks money doesn't matter, eventually becomes a burden on his friends and relatives. I have in mind the case of a minister, who told his parishioners that his salary wasn't important to him. They took him literally, paid him too little, and he was perpetually in financial hot water.
