Co-starring Robert Taylor and Ruth Hussey, "Flight Command" opens Thursday at the State. Co-billed will be "Love Crazy" with William Powell and Myrna Loy, the latter film being brought back by popular demand.

Current at the Ohio is the moving story "Song of Russia" with several fine musical scores lending background for Robert Taylor and Susan Peters.

The sad tale of many girls with the wolf at the door and their clever ways of outwitting him bring many laughs to the audiences at the Quilna where "Beautiful But Broke" is now sharing the marquee with "Cowboy Canteen."

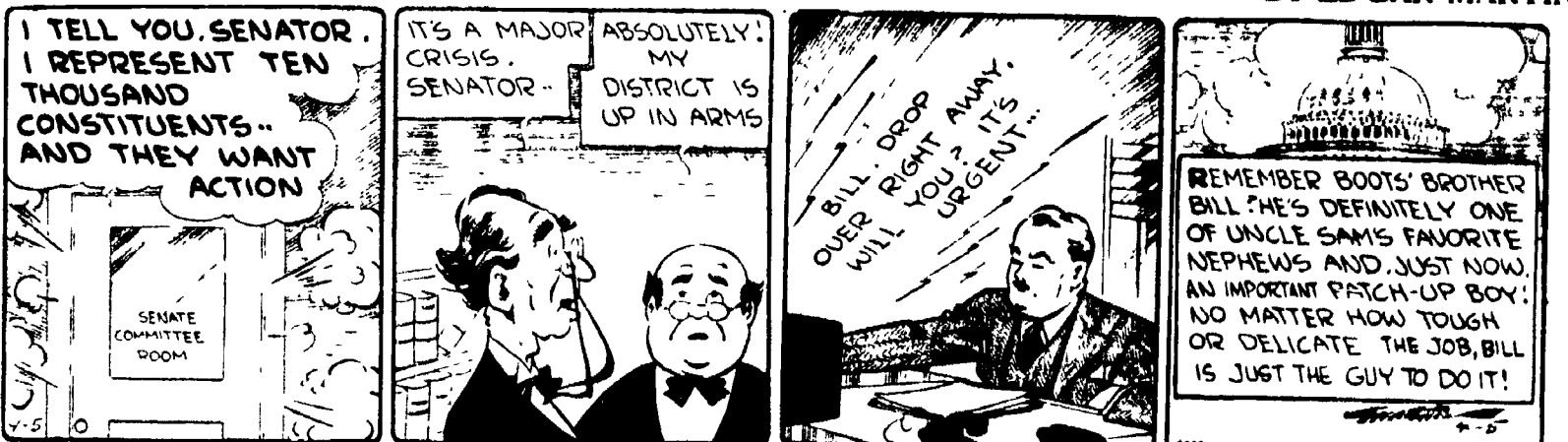

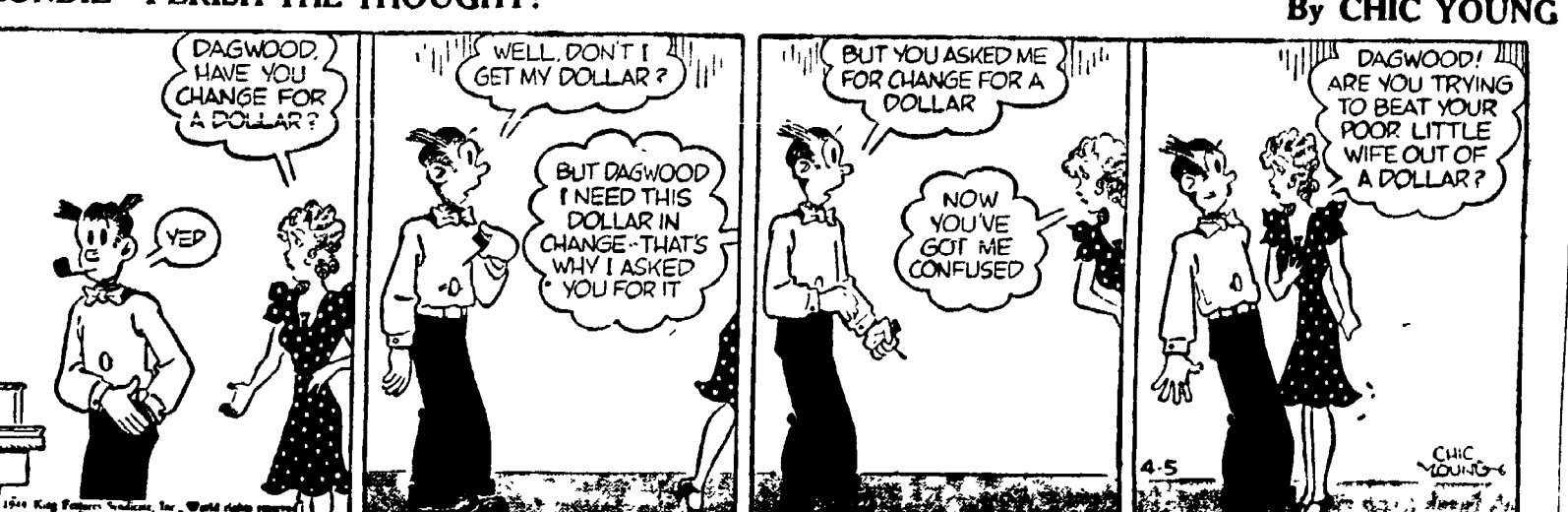

Pastor Points Course In Holy Week Sermon

"As man, lost in the night, must seek for the North star to find his position and relationship to things, so must lost humanity seek the Christ of the Cross to ascertain its proper relationship to the things of time and eternity." This statement was the basis of the sermon Wednesday noon at the Market Street Presbyterian church as Rev. Charles Henderson of First Nazarene church, conducted the third of the daily Lima Ministerial-noon-day Holy Week services.

"The Christ of the Cross, Man's Polar Star," was the topic of Rev. Henderson's remarks, as he drew a parallel between the guide for a mariner's course, and the guide for a spiritual course.

"The Star never betrays the mariner, nor will Christ fail the seaman on life's tempestuous sea," he promised.

A spiritual picture of the cross was also orally portrayed by the minister. "The Cross of Christ," he explained, "points in the length of it to Heaven and earth, reconciling them together; and in the breadth of it, to former and following ages, as being equally salvation to both."

The final service will be held Thursday noon with Rev. Arthur Kuhlman of Zion Lutheran church, speaker. Music for the program will be provided by Mrs. P. Resado Marshall organist.
