Hopeful that suitable weather for gardening is about to break in Lima and Allen-co, the county Victory Garden Committee Saturday announced that it has adopted the following slogan for the 1944 program, "Eat All You Can and Can What You Can't."

While the Victory Garden program has been delayed by inclement weather, the committee has been completed and is going to work in earnest to encourage every family in the city and county to raise or help raise garden crops.

Mrs. C. C. Romaker, co-chairman of the Lima committee, pointed out today that every can of vegetables raised in a Victory Garden and preserved for next winter will provide an extra can of food for our fighting forces.

With rationing still with us and promising to become more strict, it is more important this summer than it was last to grow a Victory Garden. Mrs. Romaker asserted. For this reason, the committee in the city and the county officials will repeat the work of the 1943 officials in attempting to lead as much assistance to prospective gardeners as possible.

One of the ways in which the committee plans to help is to aid citizens in locating lots for use during the summer and fall months for gardening. More than 600 lots were made available to gardeners last year by the owners. This number and more probably will be available this year.
