ROMAN SENATORS WERE ALLOWED TO WEAR RED SHOES

During the months I spent in Mexico, I was interested in the many persons in that country who go barefoot. This is more true of the villages and country districts than of the cities, but thousands of Mexicans seldom, if ever, put on shoes. They are mainly of Indian stock, or of mixed Indian and Spanish blood.

Barefooted men and women in Mexico seem to get along fairly well. The skin on the soles of their feet is hard and tough, due to long service on the ground. Only when they happen to step on broken glass, nails or some other sharp objects do they come to grief.

People can get along while barefoot where the climate is warm, but in northern parts the story is different. How would you like to spend a barefooted winter in northern Russia or central Alaska?

People in cold climates found ways to cover their feet long ago. Their first footwear is believed to have been made of animal hides. Pieces of skin were cut and fitted to the feet, with no effort to tan the material into leather.

People in southern Europe and northern Africa also wore foot coverings in ancient times. The chief need of Egyptians, Greeks and Romans was to take the wear off the skin of the foot, and for that reason they used sandals far more often than shoes.

Besides the sandals worn in Greece, some persons had boots and shoes. The boots were worn by hunters, and the shoes by persons who had to be outdoors during winter in colder parts of the country.

Roman hunters also wore boots, but the common people had only sandals for their feet. The richer
