Miss Bayes herself once wrote and published a "True Confessions" story which related that she had first seen the light of day in Joliet. When she died, some 15 years ago, it was published that her original home had been in Los Angeles.

In any event it is in a suburb of Los Angeles that Nora Bayes' life story was filmed for the screen, with Milwaukee sequences and her tours of triumph thru almost all important cities of the United States, except Milwaukee.
