CENTRAL SENIOR WINS OTTERBEIN SCHOLARSHIP

Miss Miriam Koch, 567 W. Market-st, a student in Lima Central high school, was informed Saturday by Morris E. Allton, acting director of Public Relations at Otterbein college, Westerville, that she was one of 15 high school seniors winning scholarships to Otterbein college as a result of competitive examinations held during February and March. One hundred seventy-five seniors took the tests.

Six of the 15 scholarships awarded were in music, two in piano, two in voice, and two in instrumental. Miss Koch won first place in piano and will receive a \$400.00 scholarship.

After preliminary examinations given at Lima on March 16, Miss Koch was invited to the campus on Saturday, April 15, for an audition before a committee of the music faculty of the college. The written examinations and the auditions formed the basis for selecting the winners.

Miss Patricia Jackson, 1064 W. Spring-st, was named as second alternate in the general scholarship examinations having ranked tenth in the general tests which she took in Lima on March 16.

FRED R. TERRY, 44-year-old construction worker from Columbus, was seriously injured late Thursday afternoon in a 50-foot fall from a scaffolding on the National Bank-bldg where he was working in the erection of a new smokestack. He was knocked off the scaffolding when a section of brick fire wall broke loose from the top of the building. He suffered compound fractures of both legs and head injuries, but two fellow workmen, Fred W. Shock and Claude Nance, escaped injury.

Pay raises for 2,800 employees of the Lima Locomotive Works Inc. were approved Friday by the Fifth Regional War Labor Board in Cleveland as the result of a union-management agreement.

It was learned Friday that Mayor A. L. Metheny, who has been ill for several weeks and recently returned after a vacation out of town, has been ordered to stay in bed for several days because of the leg condition which has been bothering him.

Lima residents were supposed to turn their clocks ahead one hour Sunday morning at 3 o'clock as the city adopted fast or eastern war time for the summer months. Eastern standard time will be restored on next Sept. 3.

Pvt. Marvin L. Paglow of Spencerville died Feb. 12 in Italy of wounds received in action that day, according to War department notice to his wife, Mrs. Marian L. Paglow.

Police Chief Kermit Westbay issued a warning Thursday to young boys and their parents over the making of crudely-fashioned "percussion" bombs, after two south end persons were injured by these missiles. The boys have been making the "bombs" by using two bolts and one nut, with powder and match heads placed between the ends of the two bolts screwed into the nut. They make a loud explosion when they hit an object and in some instances explode or are thrown for considerable distances.

Progress of 100 public grade school string instrument musicians was reviewed during the annual string instrument clinic held Friday in the various school buildings.

Disension and split authority in the Lima police department were revealed at council session Monday night when Chief Kermit Westbay, answering council's inquiries as to why monthly reports of the detective bureau were not submitted, said there is a breach between the detective and uniformed divisions of the department. Chief Westbay further reported that Inspector Ross Landfair, after making protests, had been instructed by Mayor A. L. Metheny to "run the plainclothesmen as he saw fit." The mayor was not available for statement Tuesday.

Pvt. Merrill W. Fett, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eli Fett, 905 E. High-st, was killed early Tuesday morning in an auto accident on the E. Market-st bridge. He was riding with Berlin Carroll, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Carroll, 777 S. Union-st, who was not severely injured. Fett was home on furlough from the Prisoner of War camp at Ft. Reno, Okla., where he was stationed.

City council, by a vote of 5 to 2 after considerable discussion, has authorized purchase of six lots in S. Collett-st, near the Ottawa river, at a cost of \$325, as the site for the proposed Marine Corps League arboretum as a memorial to servicemen.

J. McLean Reed, Lima schools superintendent, has been named on a 15-member committee by State Education Director Kenneth C. Ray to plan Ohio's public education in the post-war period.

Lewis Donald Culver, 5, a ward of the Allen-co children's home, was drowned Thursday afternoon when he fell into a creek near Lafayette, where he lived with Mr. and Mrs. Harold Cochen-parger, while playing with his puppies along the creek bank. His death was the second in three days under similar circumstances, a five-year-old Mendon boy being drowned earlier in the week while bathing his puppy in the creek.
